

ATTEMPTS 1,000 WAR INDUSTRIES FROM IDLENESS

Garfield's 5-Day Shutdown Into Effect at Midnight.

Disregards Senate's Strong Request to Postpone Order.

INSTRUCTS HIS STATE AGENTS

'HEATLESS'-POWERLESS' ORDER

Causes a virtual shutdown east of the Mississippi river.

Natural gas, artificial gas, wood, fuel oil and all other forms of fuel, are included in the suspension order, according to a late official ruling today.

This applies not only to the power plants, but to the mills which use gas, wood or oil, but also to those which use any other form of fuel, it was emphasized.

Theaters and other amusements places must go on as usual on Mondays from January 21 to March 25.

Department stores will be heatless Monday, but buildings containing government offices bank doctors and dentists' offices will be open.

There must be washable laundries on the workless days, as they are deemed necessary for the health of the community.

Grocery and drug stores can be heated and likewise other places.

A select list of vital war plants are exempted. Railroads, shipping, public institutions, houses, and strictly government plants but not United States war contracts, have public utilities as well as allowed to have heat.

Trrolley service will be allowed to conform to holiday schedules on the workless days.

Saloons will be closed on workless Mondays.

Papers will print as usual but on Monday's cannot run more editions than they do on legal holidays. If the paper does not run on Monday, it may publish one on Tuesday.

Washington, Jan. 18.—The fuel administration today made public a list of more than one thousand firms exempted from the fuel restriction order as being necessary to the national interest.

The Ford and Packard motor plants at Detroit so far as they are used for manufacture of aircraft and signal corps necessities are on the exempted list.

The Willys-Overland plants and practically all other motor plants working on aircraft and army orders were included with Ford and Packard.

A number of munitions, ammunitions, cotton duck and blankets exempted in the preferred list issued last night, the new list contains names of many new plants and power plants added after protests had been received today.

Washington, Jan. 18.—American industry today began sacrifice of millions that the nation's war ships will be able to keep afloat.

Through an order issued by Fuel Administrator Garfield effective at midnight, business and labor started a five day period of idleness east of the Mississippi river today.

The order will have the effect of shutting down the nation's war industry for five days, declared it.

A statement by Garfield defending his action in the face of overwhelming opposition to hold up the order for five days, declared it was necessary to clear congested piers, fill empty steamer bunkers and avoid further congestion which might delay shipment of supplies to France.

Garfield Accepts Responsibility.

Garfield himself accepts full responsibility for the order which shut down the nation.

To modify, if possible, some of the hardships it imposes, he has asked the industrial kings to bear the losses cheerfully and see that the burden does not fall on the working man, thru loss of wages on idle days.

Millions of men's wages and greater millions in production are involved in the industrial suspension. Answering complaint on this score, Garfield declared there are thousands in Europe and more still to go there, who will lose more than wages or income.

Having given the order with authority to act in such cases as the present, congress has burned its bridges behind it so far as the Garfield order is concerned. The only step which could be taken to make the order ineffective would be to repeal the food law immediately and that is not thought of seriously.

Talk of Hobbling Government.

That the law may later be amended to strip it of some of its powers however, is hinted at today.

Today opened up with another avalanche of protests from many parts of the country on the Garfield order. Demands that the order be repealed were curtailed were made to the president and congress. But there appeared little likelihood that any modification of the order would be made. If anything it may be rendered more sweeping if present industrial restrictions don't clear the tracks for coal.

Congress was indignant at Garfield's ignoring the senate request to hold up the order. Already the spirit is abroad in the capital to see that no further laws are passed that may permit precipitation of the order upon the country upon the country without congressional sanction.

But in many quarters there is expression of belief that had Garfield originally issued the statement he made last night instead of announcing what he intended to do before he himself knew exactly the order there would have been less confusion and resultant protest.

EXECUTE TROOPS WHO SYMPATHIZE WITH SOCIALISTS

Entire Companies of Austrian Soldiers Are Put To Death.

Disaffection Spreading Among Men of German Armies, Too.

STRIKE RIOTS THRU AUSTRIA

Anarchy Outbreak in Petrograd as Congress Meets.

Railroad Trains Seized by Mobs and Cars Looted.

Petrograd, Jan. 18.—Whole companies of Austrian troops have been ordered shot for their sympathy with Russian Socialist views, according to reports reaching here today.

According to reports here, many units of Austrian forces on the Italian front have been ordered executed for their refusal to obey their officers.

Disaffection against their militarist masters is spreading among German troops, also.

The German government is making strenuous efforts to stop the spread of Russian propaganda and of sympathy with Russian beliefs.

Foreign Minister Trotsky himself telegraphed from Brest-Litovsk today that the German government was "deliberately garbling reports of the peace negotiations."

Presumably this is in line with the Teutonic effort to mislead public opinion in the central powers.

News from the camp of 25,000 German troops who deserted their commands and accepted Russian principles of Socialism today asserted that the men were armed and organized for a strike.

The men live by foraging and contributions from sympathetic peasants.

A similar situation of disaffection among the men is reported along the whole of the Austro-Italian front, according to messages received here.

London, Jan. 18.—Serious strikes accompanied by rioting have taken place at Vienna and in other cities of Austria, according to news agency telegrams from Zurich and points in Switzerland.

Loot Food Shops in Vienna.

The troubles, it is asserted, are due to the prolongation of the peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk, the continuation of the reduced bread rations—
