ONE MORE BILL.

When Is It Passed Congress Probably Will Adjourn.

Washington, Oct. 9.—Official announcement was made at the white house today that President Wilson approves the plan to adjourn congress as soon as the war revenue bill has been passed. It was said he would like to see the Alaska coal-land bill passed, but would not insist that congress be kept in session to consider it.

The president is interested in the cotton situation, but the information at the white house today was that he was opposed to the bill agreed on last night by southern members of congress for a government loan of \$250,000,000 to cotton planters.

While the president realizes there is no great pressure from the south for cotton relief legislation he is said to believe private bankers, with the support of the treasury, can handle the situation.

Trooper Wilson Dies.

Naco, Oct. 9.—Trooper Wilson of the Tenth United States cavalry, wounded by a Mexican bullet fired across the line during an attack on Naco, Sonora, Sunday, died today at Fort Huachuca. Wilson was shot in the breast.
