Tuesday Dinner.
Next Tuesday the Methodist ladies will serve a thirty-five cent dinner in the former garage room opposite the depot on North Main street to which all are invited and they are noted for giving inviting dinners. The first table will be spread at 11:30 and kept going as long as the lamp holds out and the cooks are willing. Athletic and Forum Meet.
The Western Kansas High Schools will meet at Hays the 29th and 30th of this month to compete with one another in track and field events and in the art of oratory and music. Seven of the leading high schools will be represented in this meet, namely, Wilson, Russell, Hays, Ellis, Wakeeney, Hill City, and Plainville and it is very likely that Colby will send a few men to uphold their honor in the athletic events and in oratory.

The entries for the meet have been divided into two classes, A and B, the weight limit used as the basis of division. All entries in class (B) must weigh between 100 lbs. and 130 lbs. All entries in class (A) must weigh over 130 lbs. A division has also been made in the forensic events. Eighth grade pupils will compete in declamation and the high school pupils compete in oratory. Both will compete in music. The first day of the meet will be class B's day. The afternoon of this day will be given over to the athletic events and the evening to the forensic. A similar division has been made of the 2nd day, which is class A's day. An admission of twenty-five cents will be charged for each afternoon and evening of the event. Season tickets can be purchased for 75 cents.

The following is the list of events that will be pulled off. **ATHLETIC:** 100 yard dash, one mile run, one-half mile run, 440 yard dash, 220 yard hurdles, pole vault, relay race, shot put, discus throw, run high jump, run broad jump, tug-o-war. **FORENSIC:** Oration, declamation, vocal music, instrumental music.
