JAY GOULD IN KANSAS.

Jay Gould, accompanied by his son, George J. Gould, and by several officers and directors of Missouri Pacific railroad, is making his semi-annual tour of inspection, and will be in Kansas this week and next.

The Missouri Pacific Railway Company now owns and operates 1,764 miles of railway within the limits of the state of Kansas. The roads it controls are managed by several different names, including in addition to the Missouri Pacific proper, the Central Branch Union Pacific, the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, the St. Louis, Ft. Scott & Wichita, the Denver, Memphis & Atlantic, the Kansas, Nebraska & Dakota, the Salina & Western, the Kansas & Arizona, and many other railway branches.

We have seen it said, in eastern papers, that Mr. Gould is not a railroad builder. So far as his relations with Kansas are concerned, this is not true. He has built many hundreds of miles of railroads within the limits of this state and is really the inspirer, the originator of the railway building boom which was inaugurated in Kansas a year and a half ago.
