Freberg, wanted by the authorities of York county, Nebraska, was arrested in Seward, Friday, and today Sheriff Lancaster, of York county, started for his home in the prisoner. Lyndon, Kas., March 26.—It has cost the Lyndon farmers a few weeks ago \$400 to learn that the milk from cows fed on Kafir corn will not produce good butter. For the past three months the country has been flooded with Kafir corn, and many farmers have been able to make high grade butter, and has lost about \$400 on a reduction in the price. He had experts at work to locate the cause, but they have been unable to find it. The common laborers at the creamery did some experimenting on his own account. He kept the milk separate and the butter made from the milk fed on Kafir corn was what brought down the grade of the butter.
