

KANSAS ARMY ORDERS.

The "Military" Gets Its Orders to Move on Topeka. Entire Forces Mobilized for the Fall Festival.

Twenty Companies of Militia to Be Here With Cannon and Camp Equipage.

The official order for the encampment of the Kansas national guard in connection with the Fall Festival was issued from the war department today. It is in full as follows:

Office of the Adjutant General, Topeka, August 6, 1897. GENERAL ORDERS NO. 6.

The Kansas national guard will encamp at Topeka, September 17 to October 2, inclusive.

Troops will be routed from this department and the necessary orders for transportation will be furnished by the adjutant general.

Company commanders will inspect all equipment and see that all preparations for moving are completed by September 20.

Troops will travel to and from encampment in military order. All necessary clothing and toilet articles will be packed in blanket bags.

All baggage will be transported on the same train with the extra or useless baggage will be allowed.

Company commanders will be accounted for by the adjutant general and their men while en route. No man will leave the cars without the permission of a commissioned officer.

Immediately after the arrival the company will be formed and march to camp.

No subsequent order for transportation will be issued. All officers and enlisted men must accompany their company.

All troops en route will supply themselves with the travel ration.

Programme of instructions will be announced each evening from brigade headquarters.

No other than legally enlisted men and authorized employees will be transported and substitutes will not be allowed.

The brigade commander will assume control of the camp ground on the day prior to the encampment. He will see that all property is properly guarded.

All caterers' help and citizen employees will be provided with a badge or written pass and camp equipage and their employment will not be permitted to roam about the camp.

Mr. S. C. A. Horn, secretary of the Topeka division of the Order of Railway Conductors, has an idea for the Santa Fe parade which he will endeavor to have carried out. He proposes that all engine and trainmen marching in the big parade carry umbrellas of red, green and white, the three colors of the engine and train service.

The effect of a large number of men carrying the colored umbrellas will be decidedly pretty. Mr. Horn will take the matter up with the different orders.

Two nights each week will be devoted to this practice.
