WOULD LAND SALINA JOB.

T. St. Peter Told What He Did to Roads.

Theo. St. Peter attended a meeting of the Salina good roads enthusiasts Tuesday night and tried to land the job of working the roads the commercial club proposes to improve. The Union says:

T. St. Peter, road builder, was present from Dickinson county. He is the builder of the Enterprise road, a famous stretch of road between Abilene and Enterprise. It is three miles long.

"I can make a good road as easily as I can a bad one," said St. Peter. Early in the spring is the time to put the roads into shape. First, clean out the ditches and burn the trash and then level the roads. People won't believe it, but I can make good roads faster and better with a sled than I can with a grader. All the grader is good for is to shape the road. Then I don't touch the grader any more that year. I can easily take care of twenty-five miles of road with four teams and keep it up in season.

"The Enterprise road I built for \$150. I made \$2.50 profit on the whole job. I built that road simply to show the people what could be done in the way of road making. That was three years ago and since that time the road has not been touched. Yet it is still in excellent condition."

H. Lee, who brought Mr. St. Peter from Dickinson county, stated that he had lately driven over the Enterprise road and that it was as fine as any Kansas City boulevard. Mr. Kirtland said he has also taken a spin over the road in an auto last fall and found it in excellent shape.

At that point Fred Quincy called attention to a new law. He said the law provided for the appointment of a county engineer to oversee all road matters in the county. The township, however, could limit the work as they saw fit. The county surveyor or may be appointed to this position. Mr. Quincy said it would be necessary to get the consent of the townships as well as the engineer before private contractors could take care of the road.

In Saline county the road engineer has not yet been appointed.

Some wanted to hire St. Peter that night to build roads. Mr. Watson and others favored the offering of prizes.

Finally on motion of Mr. Kimball, a committee consisting of H. D. Lee, W. W. Watson and F. H. Quincy was appointed to devise plans for road improvement. These plans are to be submitted to those who subscribed to the road fund and, if the plans are satisfactory, the committee will be employed to go on with the work.

PRIZES TO LADIES WHO SELL BASEBALL TICKETS.

It Will Cost only \$10 for a Ticket to All Games.

The Abilene baseball association settled the matter of season tickets at a meeting held last evening. Season tickets will be sold to men good for admission to both grounds and grand stand for \$10. This ticket is good for all the 35 games of the championship series and single admissions to all of these games would amount to \$12.25. In addition to this there will be a Decoration day game and probably five first class exhibition games during the practice season before the championship series opens. These extra games would cost at single admissions \$2.10 more. The holder of a season ticket will also be admitted to these games. The season ticket admits the holder to all games given by the association to the end of the championship season, so it may be seen that the man who buys a season ticket gets \$14.35 worth of baseball for \$10.00.

The association wants the support and encouragement of the fairer sex and is making a strong bid to secure it. Ladies' season tickets carrying all the privilege of the men's season tickets will be sold for \$7.50. All season tickets will be transferable but they will have a space for the signature of the owner so that ticket may be taken up at the gate in the event that it should be lost. There may be some men who do not care for a season ticket including admission to the grand stand and it is probable that a season ticket good for grounds will be sold for \$7.50, but this matter has not been positively decided.

It may as well be understood first as last that with just one exception there will be no free list. The men who made baseball possible in Abilene guaranteed \$25 to see the season carried through and they have put up all of the money that has thus far been called for. A certificate of stock and a season ticket was issued to them. This opportunity was offered to everyone and it is still open. Every stockholder and every officer who gets any additional tickets will pay for them. Two tickets will be issued to every newspaper in the county and the association will receive more for them than any other tickets it disposes of. Just one free ticket will be issued and that one will go to R. W. Hoffman, of Enterprise, president of the league.

The association will conduct a contest and will give two prizes, \$10 in gold and one season ticket, to the two ladies turning in the largest amount of money from the sale of season tickets. A commission will also be paid on each ticket sold. Full details of the contest will be announced later.

The association has now the signatures of about fifteen players on contracts and there are two or three contracts out that have not yet been returned. The board of directors is much pleased with present conditions.

The Junction City management is interested in knowing how the report started that there is a chance that Doherty, the Fort Riley pitcher, will play with either Abilene or Salina. Doherty will pitch for the Junction City team and will make trouble for both Abilene and Salina during the season.

Salina Union: One thing can be said in favor of Abilene; it will have a lot of enthusiastic and pretty girls who will fight to a finish for that team. A Union reporter met a bunch of Abilene girls Sunday and they were absolutely baseball crazy. They were willing to bet anything that Abilene would win the pennant.

Salina Journal: If Abilene can put out as good a league team as it has in the high school line, the others had better look out. That kid team is setting too fast a gait for the other teams of its class. Of course it may be due to Sommers, who will play with Ellsworth this summer.

Sommers, who will catch for Ellsworth this year, is receiving more advertising in the C. K. league papers than any other player on the circuit.

President Hoffman of the Central Kansas league, has written the managers of the Salina team that they need not worry about exhibition games. "I will have all you want," said Mr. Hoffman. This means that he is now in correspondence with a number of teams who want to play at the opening of the season here.

while of number of them will be found on the C. K. circuit. The State season opens too early in June and the college players will hardly have time to get out of condition before they will be playing every day.

The Abilene management has a new scheme. Its players will also play in the band. Thus the league and the band will sort of go "havers" on expenses, making a saving for each side.

It will probably be pretty dull in Mid-Kaw baseball circles now until the players begin to report for practice. Most of the teams have signed practically all the men they expect to use, for the first few weeks of the season anyway, so the dope writers over the circuit will have little or nothing on which to work until the practice season begins.

Salina Union: The press and preachers only will be given passes in the Central Kansas league. Favorites will have to pay the same as other people. The courtesy of a pass is generally extended to ministers while, because of the fact that the press is compelled to properly report the games, it is only fair that they should receive passes. And they give, in free writeups, a whole lot more than their tickets would cost.

Junction City is to have a tip top official scorer. Tom Dorn has been named for the place by President Hoffman, at the recommendation of officials of the local association. Dorn is a thorough fan and has been a close student of the game for many years. He will be an unusually competent official scorer. Mr. Hoffman seems to have the faculty of getting exactly the right men for the official positions---and he is exactly the right man for the place he holds.

The players are perhaps more in

terested in the selection of official scorers than are the fans. The scorers make up the records from which the individual fielding and batting averages are figured for the season. These averages are looked to by managers the country over as indicating the class of the players. However, there are a few exceptions to this proposition as a general rule. Occasionally a man compiles a batting average of 350 in one of the minor leagues. He goes higher and it develops that 225 really expresses his actual batting speed. The reason is easy. He has been a favorite with one of two scorers in the lower league class and they have been crediting with safe hits, when instead some fielder on the opposing team should have been charged with an error. When the scoring rules are fairly applied to the batting of the favorite player his average shrinks and he soon goes back to the brush league in which his average was padded. It is to be hoped that there will be a minimum of that sort of work on this circuit---Junction City Union.
