DEFENDS THE DAIRIES.

D. M. Wilson Answers Attack of Traveling Men.

The petition sent to the governor by the Wichita traveling men in regard to the poor quality of Kansas butter has called forth the following defense of Kansas dairies by D. M. Wilson, state dairy commissioner.

"In honest defense of the honor of the state and its dairy interests I am forced to defend their rights inasmuch as a complaint founded upon the material furnished by the hotels and restaurants as butter would be unjust to the dairy interests of not only Kansas but of this great commonwealth. Since the first of December, which marked the special advance in butter prices, I have noticed that a substitute for butter is being quite generally furnished. For the past two months I have kept a close check and find that the greater number of hotels and restaurants are using oleomargarine or butterine. As the writer has had occasion to make the hotels and restaurants his temporary home I can truly sympathize with the commercial travelers.
