Wm. Ramsey and Emeline McKen were united in marriage near Burlington, Iowa, on Nov. 8, 1855. To this union ten children were born, five of whom died in infancy. There are now four living sons and one daughter: W. J. has been connected with the J. B. Case department store at Abilene for 17 years. Chas. M. resides at Luray, Kans., where he operates an elevator, flour and feed store for a Salina firm. He is the present mayor of Luray.
