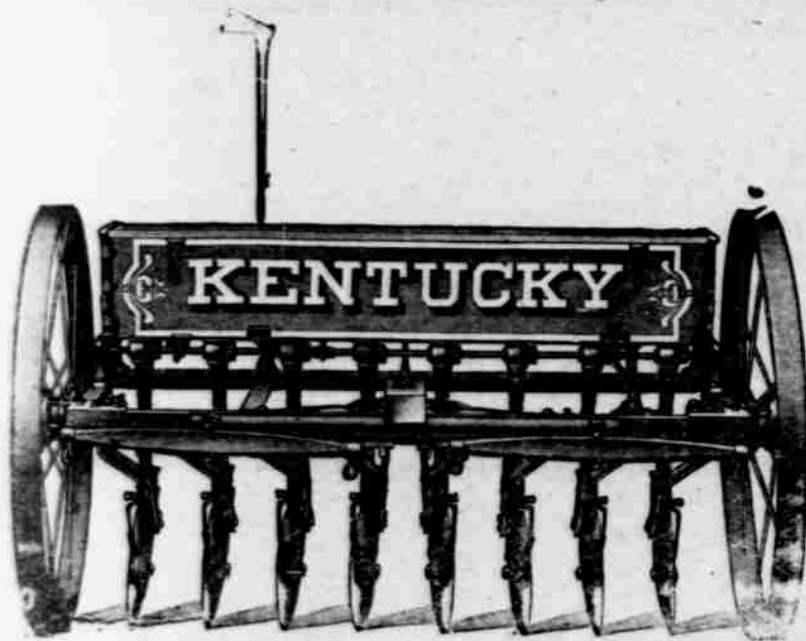

It is immoral for a government to tax the whole people for the benefit of a favored few. A government founded on an special privilege cannot endure. It is a splendid victory for Democracy when one of the traditional strongholds of privilege is at last captured. Such a triumph is more important in itself and in its indirect effects than in the immediate practical consequences of the victory. —Kansas City Star.

### Mr. Parkes Passes.

The death of Mr. John B. Parkes at his handsome home, formerly the Stone Walker residence, came shortly after the CLIMAX was printed Friday afternoon. He had been in a precarious condition for several months, due to hardening of the arteries, and the end was not unexpected. Several years ago Mr. Parkes came to this city from Paint Lick, where he was a large farmer and stockman, and where with the Walker brothers, he was a great devotee of the fox hunt, and his home was the center of a large circle of kindred spirits. He served a term as president of the National Fox Hunters Association, and was very popular with the members of the organization as well as generally. He continued to operate his farm at Paint Lick while living here and to keep his fox hounds which had won so many trophies. Mr. Parkes was 69 years of age and a veteran of the Civil War, having served on the Union side in the 6th Kentucky Cavalry. He was a man of wealth and a director in the Citizens National Bank, of this city. Two daughters survive, Mrs. Bolton Kilgore, of San Angelo, Texas, and Miss Jennie Parkes, of this city, together with sisters and brothers, as follows: Mrs. Nannie P. Smith, Mrs. W. W. Watts, Mrs. Nannie P. Embury and James B. Parkes and a half-brother and sister, Mr. S. S. Parkes and Mrs. James Wilmore, all of this city. He was an uncle of Thomas J. Smith, State Banking Commissioner, of Frankfort, Ky. Funeral services were held at the residence at three o'clock Sunday afternoon and long concourse of friends followed the remains to their resting place in the Richmond cemetery.
