REPEAL INSURANCE LAW

Strong Protest Made Against Act That Caused Withdrawal of Companies.

Frankfort, Ky., March 16.—Business men from many parts of Kentucky are bitterly opposed to the provisions of the Green-Glepa insurance law that caused the withdrawal of many fire insurance companies from the State during the past week. They request Governor McCreary to call a special session of the Legislature to repeal the law. Petitions signed by thousands of business men, were presented to the governor today. Colonel Noel Gaines addressed a letter to Representative Frank C. Green and Senator Selden Glenn asking them to stand pat on their bill. He advocates the passage of a measure putting Kentucky in the insurance business to take care of the property of insurance companies that have withdrawn from the State. The companies declared they quit writing new business because the provisions of the law are too drastic.
