It seemed to be the consensus of opinion to have a system of boulevard lights from the C. & O. depot to the L. & N. depot, and a reduction in price to all consumers.

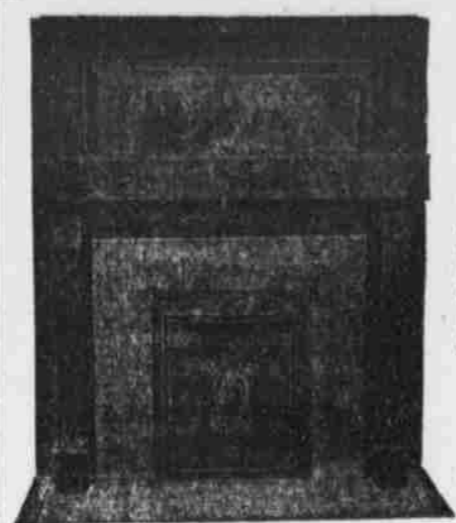

POSTMASTER KEHOE

President Wilson Sent Name of Marcus F. Kehoe in For Confirmation By Senate Yesterday

Big Victory Scored By Ex-Congressman James N. Kehoe, Who Licked Democratic Opponents to a Frazzle

Postmaster Clarence Mathews of Maysville is to be succeeded by Marcus F. Kehoe as announced several weeks ago.

President Wilson yesterday sent the name of Mr. Kehoe to the Senate for confirmation.

Thus the short but intensely warm contest in the Democratic ranks of Maysville and Mason County over the local postmastership is settled and Mr. Kehoe's regular appointment for four years will be made and he will likely succeed Postmaster Mathews on April 1st next.

Mr. Mathews is a Taft Republican and has the record for service, having held the office for over 16 years. He retires with the satisfaction of having served the people faithfully and has the confidence and esteem of the public, the Democrats as well as that of his own party.

M. F. Kehoe, while never very active in Democratic action and councils, nevertheless, is a man of sterling worth and is a member of the Kehoe family of Maysville, whose sons William F. Kehoe and John Dexter Kehoe, of Washington, D. C., former Congressman James N. Kehoe of Maysville, and Dr. Henry C. Kehoe of Frankfort, have each made eminent successes in life, all starting out to fight life's battle poor, but courageous and manly boys, and they have won their way by worth, merit and pluck.

PROHIBITION DEAD LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS

Tunis Measure Wins—Latter Permits Increase in License Fees For Saloons in Cities From Present Maximum of \$500

Frankfort, Ky., March 17.—The Webb State-wide prohibition bill died in the Senate tonight, but the dry people were a victory when the Tunis bill under which it is possible for the cities of Kentucky to lift the present charge for licenses for saloons from \$500 to \$1,000 or over was passed in the House, having already passed the Senate. That the Governor will sign it seems to be a foregone conclusion.

Representative Matt S. Walton, of Lexington, frankly explained that the purpose of the measure was to reduce the number of saloons in Lexington, which was 129 coffee houses. The vote on the bill was 52 to 22. Interest in the prohibition amendment was intense throughout the day. The dispensary feature of the measure it is believed, caused the greatest opposition to it, outside the forces in the legislature which voted with the liberals on general principles. The greatest excitement prevailed during the taking of the vote on the bill which put it to sleep and there was breathless silence as each member responded to the roll-call.

BOTH AMENDMENTS
