FIRE AT DOVER

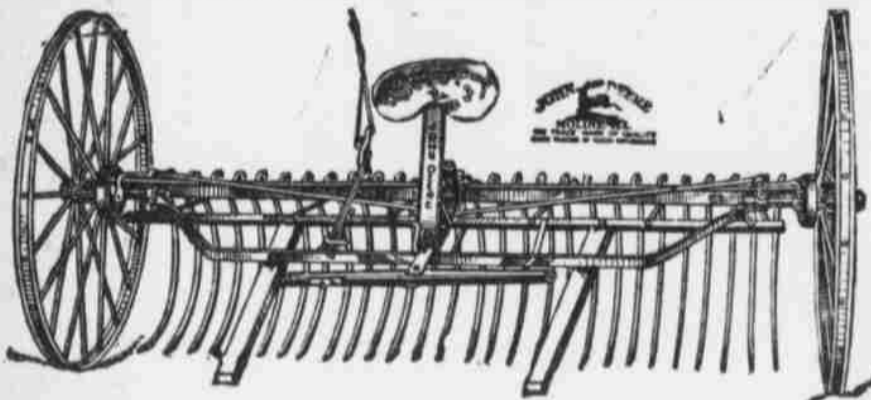
M. A. Thompson's Poultry House, Two Horses, 100 Chickens and Other Property Burned.

This morning at 1 o'clock the poultry house belonging to Mr. M. A. Thompson, agent of the C. & O. at Dover and near the depot, was entirely consumed by fire, together with three coops of chickens, his huckster wagon, two horses and other property.

The loss will reach about \$1,800 with \$375 insurance.

This is the second time in two years that Mr. Thompson has had his poultry depot burned out and the loss has been very severe upon him.

THE SALEM FIRE LOSS WAS \$12,000,000.

Relief work for the 18,000 persons made homeless by the Salem fire is well under way, and all are being cared for. An insurance adjuster Saturday estimated that the loss will be \$12,000,000 with \$10,000,000 worth of insurance. The poor suffered most in the fire as the meaner sections of the city were destroyed completely.

EDWARD VARVALL DROWNED

Fourteen-Year-Old Boy Meets Sad Fate While Playing in the Ohio River Yesterday Morning.

Edward Varvall, fourteen-year-old son of Win Varvall of Smoky Hollow, was drowned yesterday morning while playing in the river near Gable's coal float at the foot of Short street about 11:45 o'clock. He was wading in the water and walked into a step-off, and being unable to swim, went under.

A number of boys were at the dock but did not realize that the little fellow was drowning until after he had gone under for the third time. His body was recovered by Joe Harrison after having been in the water for about forty minutes.

Dr. Braud was called but the boy was beyond the help of medical assistance when he arrived some twenty minutes after the body had been recovered.

Coroner Black being out of town, Squire Bauer held the inquest and the jury returned a verdict of accidental death by drowning.

The body was removed to the home of his father at Smoky Hollow.
