CRISIS COMING FOR EUROPEAN NATIONS

Paris May Be Again Besieged By Germans

LATEST WAR BULLETINS

Horrors of War In Tabloid.

"The road from Malines toward Brussels, six miles northeast of Brussels, is littered with bodies of men and horses, while in the fields pasturing cattle have been killed by shrapnel."—Antwerp Dispatch.

The Cologne Gazette states that at the battle of Lorraine 300,000 men were engaged on each side, the greatest number yet engaged in the history of the world.

"The defeat of the kaiser will bring the United States of Europe,"—Daily Mail, Official Journal of Christiania, Norway.

"France is issuing ten-cent notes to replace small coins, which are being hoarded."—Paris Dispatch.

"Xavier de Castelneau, the 12-year old son of Gen. Castelneau, chief of staff, was among the killed in recent action."—Paris Dispatch.

"Wounded soldiers arriving here relate that Prince Frederick Charles of Hesse, the emperor's brother-in-law, while leading his regiment during a recent battle, seized a flag from the hands of the wounded flag bearer and carried it on to victory."—Frankfurt-on-the-Main Dispatch.

"A Russian army order prohibits the use of food and forage abandoned by the Germans in East Prussia because of cases of poisoning which have occurred at Eylkhanen, Gumbinnen and Insterburg."—St. Petersburg Dispatch.

"Refugees from the scene of the fighting around Mons report that air men took a prominent part in directing the German artillery, says the Times correspondent in Paris. Aeroplanes hovered over the British positions and their pilots signaled the German batteries by means of a disc swung at the end of a line."—London Dispatch.

"A wounded Colonel, now in hospital here, was running away, carrying his severed arm, when he fell unconscious. He felt nothing when it was shot off, but would not leave it as 'meat for Prussian dogs.'"—Paris Dispatch.

An English captain, at the front, said to the correspondent of the Temps, after the summary execution of a spy: "You French pride yourselves on your humanity, where humanity is a useless sentimentality. To spare the life of a spy is a military crime."

Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse Sunk By British Ship.

London, Aug. 27.—The Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse has been sunk off the west coast of Africa by the British cruiser High Flyer.

The Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse was one of the palatial steamers of the North German Lloyd line.

Urges Americans To Leave Europe. Washington, August 27.—Secretary Bryan late today cabled all embassies and legations in Europe to urge Americans to leave Europe without delay.

Expecting Turkey To Declare War. Diplomats and officials generally are expecting a declaration of war by Turkey upon the allies.

Paris, Aug. 27.—Paris, it is officially announced today, is preparing for a possible siege.
