**ELABORATE PROGRAM
ARRANGED FOR
OPENING NIGHT**

Cincinnati Radio Broadcasting Station
To Open September 22nd
With an Extra Big Program.

One of the most elaborate programs ever broadcasted from a wireless telephone station has been prepared for Friday evening, September 22, the opening night of the new and powerful radio plant of the Crosley Manufacturing Company, Cincinnati, Ohio. The call letters of this new station will be W. L. W., the same as those assigned to the old station of the Crosley Company which has been so popular among the radio fans of the middle west.

The concert will be started promptly at 8 p. m. when there will be an invocation by the Rev. Dr. Arba Martin, pastor of the Walnut Hills Methodist church. This will be followed by a brief talk by Mr. Powell Crosley, Jr., president of the Crosley Manufacturing Company.

Other speakers will be Mayor George P. Carrol, William F. Wiley, publisher of The Enquirer, Captain Wade Mountfort, managing editor of the Commercial Tribune, and Elmer Fries, editor of the Post.

At the conclusion of these addresses representatives of the Cincinnati College of Music will render a series of beautiful vocal, piano, violin and cello selections. These representatives will be Miss Marie Houston, Miss Hazel Brewsnaugh, Miss Edith Tolken and Mr. Arthur Knecht, advanced students of the college, who have been selected to take part in the opening concert because they have proven their ability

to perform wonderfully. Next will be pupils of Miss Minnie Tracy, well-known music teacher, whose graduates rank among the foremost artists of the United States. She likewise has selected her most efficient students to take part in this concert, assuring all those who "listen in" the best music obtainable. Those who will represent Miss Tracy's school will be Miss Rode Boden, Miss Marguerite Hukill, Mrs. Ida Lee Blackschlager, Mrs. Minnette Salman Sumberg, Mr. Oscar Colker and Mr. Arnold Schroeder.

Part three of the concert will be composed of selections by the Sinton Hotel Orchestra, one of the best in Cincinnati, intermingled with vocal selections by Mr. Colker. This feature will be tremendously interesting to those radio fans who take delight in listening to exceptionally fine popular orchestra selections.

At the conclusion of these selections there will be two songs by Mr. Eugene Schmitt, baritone, whose voice has been heard so often this summer by those who tuned in when W. L. W. was in operation. Then will come popular piano selections by professors of the Awanda Studios, who rank among the foremost popular song players of the mid-west.

ISSUE PRICES OF TREASURY SAVINGS CERTIFICATES TO BE INCREASED.

Columbus, Ohio. — According to an announcement by the Savings Division of the Fourth Federal Reserve District the issue prices of Treasury Savings Certificates will be increased effective October 1st, to \$620.00 for the \$1,000 certificates, \$22.00 for the \$100 certificates and \$20.50 for the \$25 certificates. At these prices the certificates will yield 4 per cent, compounded semi-annually, if held until maturity.

These increases, it was stated, will readjust the interest rates on the Certificates to conform to present interest levels in the general market.

Until September 30th these certificates can be purchased at practically all postoffices at the current prices of \$800.00 for the \$1,000 certificates, \$30 for the \$100 certificates and \$20 for the \$25 certificates, at which prices the certificates will yield 4 1/2 per cent, compounded semi-annually.

BANDITS ROB GAMBLERS.

Chicago, Sept. 19. — Thirty alleged gamblers were held up and robbed to-night of \$5,750 by two men while they were waiting in a pool hall for the returns from the last race at Lexington, Ky.

After taking all the money in sight and going through their victims' pockets, the robbers fled, but one of them was captured after a chase through the downtown streets during which he threw away a pistol and \$500 in bills.
