Four Hours Before Time for the Wedding.

GROOM INDICTED FOR MURDER

Mexico, Mo., June 5—Indicted for murder in the second degree four hours before he led a bride to the altar is the sad experience of Clarence A. Barnes, a prominent young Republican attorney of this city. Mr. Barnes was married to Miss Ruth Lakeman, one of Mexico's fairest and most prominent society girls, at 8:30 o'clock last night by Rev. Fielding Marvin. The ceremony was performed at the Promenade street Methodist church before a fashionable audience. Four hours previous the Andrain county grand jury had returned an indictment against the groom charging murder, in the second degree. The court admitted the defendant to bond in the sum of \$10,000, the bond being filled out at once by some of the most prominent citizens of Mexico.

Clarence Barnes became involved in a terrific street battle in front of the Mexico postoffice with Representative Rhodes Clay on Thursday afternoon, July 10, 1902. Pistols were the weapons and the firing was done at close range, Clay being mortally shot and dying an hour later.

MOTHER DIED FOR CHILD.

Cadiz, June 5—Lucy Garnett, colored, and her little daughter attempted to cross a swollen stream near Herndon when the child fell from a log into the water. The woman, in an effort to rescue her daughter, also fell into the stream, and was drowned. The child succeeded in reaching the bank in safety.

And the Electric Light Muddle Comes to a Head.

Much Routine Business Transacted By the Board of Aldermen Last Night.

SEVERAL ORDINANCES CHANGE

The board of aldermen met last night in regular session with all members present.

The report of the library committee, saying that only \$888 would be left out of the \$35,000 donated by Mr. Carnegie and that the city would have to appropriate sufficient money with which to stock the building with books and shelving was read and referred.

A receipt from Treasurer Kraus for the tax books which were received from the clerk, was filed.

The board ordered payment of the \$200 judgment recently filed in the case of Wurth against the city.

The printing bill against the city lodged by the News-Democrat was referred to the clerk for examination and if found to be correct to be paid.

Mayor Yeiser presented the papers filed with him by the light committee several days ago in which charges of neglect, incompetency and the sale of city material without reporting the same were made against Superintendent Harry Wallace, of the city electric light plant. Mayor Yeiser stated that he had suspended Mr. Wallace this month pending the examination and the motion to try the charges by the entire board next Wednesday night in open session was carried.

The proposition made by the I. C. road, in which it agrees to give to Paducah the Clark street property for \$500 and the privilege of running another spur track down Ninth street as far as Harrison, was filed.

E. C. Terrell was awarded the contract for grading and graveling of 14th street, between Broadway and Monroe streets for 24 cents per lineal foot.

A contract giving E. Berry the privilege of trying his patent smoke consumer to the city electric light plant was ratified. This will be of no expense to the city unless a success.

Pipe necessary to build a sewer was turned over to Mr. Sam Liebel who claims that the street grade in front of his property is not right and the water stands on the property. The cost will amount to \$40.

The matter of the city placing a fence between Mr. Sam Liebel's property and the city pest house was referred.

The mayor was ordered to receive bids for the printing of city ordinance for distribution.

The payment of balance on the city map made by Mr. W. W. Lyon, was referred. The city has refused to pay this bill on the allegations that the map is incomplete.

Ed Eaker was awarded the contract for grading and graveling an alley between Seventh and Eighth, Caldwell and Norton streets.

The treasurer's report showing \$8,865.49 collected during the past month with \$9,230.24 expenditures, was received and filed.

Bills amounting to \$6,528.39, the regular accounts against the city, were allowed.

A bill for \$70 was allowed the commercial club for their expenses in conducting visitors contemplating the location for an industry, over the city.

William Augustus, ex-assistant fire chief, was allowed a bill of \$110 for several months' salary.

First passage was given the ordinance granting the I. C. road the privilege of running a spur track across Myers street.

First passage was given an ordinance granting the I. C. privilege to run a spur track to the Scott-Koger house at Washington and First street.

The ordinance granting the I. C. the privilege of running a spur track over North Ninth, from Trimble to Harrison streets, was given first passage.

First passage was given the bill providing for paved streets throughout the business portion of the city, this idea having been suggested by Mayor Yeiser several days ago.

The ordinance fixing the salary of the city solicitor at \$900 per year was read and the amount changed to \$1,000 per year. The salary of the city attorney, whose office was kept separate from the solicitor, was fixed at

\$720 originally but was changed to \$900 per annum and both ordinances given first passage.

The ordinance fixing the city assessor's salary at \$900 per year with \$100 per year for an assistant, was given first passage.

The ordinance fixing the salary of the city treasurer at \$1,800 per annum was read and on motion of Alderman Chamblin with seconds from Aldermen Singleton and Starks, the amount was cut to \$1,500 and first passage given the ordinance.

The ordinance granting the N. C. and St. L. road the privilege of crossing Meyers with a spur track, was given first passage.

The monthly report of fire chief Woods was received and filed.

The water company was ordered to extend its mains on Madison streets between 17th and 18th streets, and also on South Tenth street.

The water company was given the privilege of excavating in front of its plant to prepare for the filtration plant.

A complaint was lodged against the I. C. road by Alderman Chamblin who stated that the company had been blocking Tennessee street by leaving cars across the crossing too long. Agent John Donovan who was present, promised to rectify the matter.

An ordinance was ordered brought in providing for improvements to South Tenth street between Elizabeth and Husbands streets, by grading and graveling.

The street inspector was ordered to repair defective drainage on Meyers street.

An investigation was made relative to what had been done towards repairing the defective Broadway pavements and city engineer Washington stated that he had received bids from contractors and would hand them in to the mayor today for opening.

The Independent Telephone Co. was ordered to repair the alley between Broadway and Court, First and Second street, which had been left in bad condition by the men excavating for poles.

Marshal Crow was instructed to look after the porters who persist in sweeping trash from business houses into the streets.

On motion the board adjourned.
