The absence of the usual early fruits and vegetables of the South has also broken up a very large and lucrative trade, causing heavy losses to a numerous class of traders and to hotels and boarding house keepers, who make their contracts in advance.

Great curiosity and uneasiness prevailed in New York in relation to the whereabouts of Gen. Beauregard. He is generally supposed to be in Richmond, or coming to the support of Gen. Jos. E. Johnston.

The people admit severe disaster in the defeat of Banks and Shields, and look upon Jackson as a general worthy of the name he bears. Capt. D. inquired of a wounded Irishman, who had been wounded in one of the thighs with Jackson, how it happened that the Federals who fought so fiercely with the bayonet were whipped so badly. He replied, not knowing our friend to be a Southerner, "Och now away wid your nonsense about the Federals using the bayonet; the boot is on the other leg."—Charleston Courier.

Headquarters Camp of Instruction, Monroe, La., July 14, 1862. Order No. 1.

1. The undersigned has been assigned to the command of the Camps of Instruction in Western Louisiana and has entered upon his duties.

2. All enrolling officers will return their rolls to this office without delay, if finished, and if not finished, they must be without delay.

3. The enrolling officers of each Parish North of Red River will collect the conscripts and forward them to this station on receipt of this order. Each man must bring a blanket, a knife, fork, spoon, canteen, haversack, and tin cup and plate; also a change of clothing.

4. The conscripts south of Red River will be sent to Opelousas without delay, and turned over to the commanding officer at that Post, furnished as above.

5. The Quartermaster's and Commissary's department will furnish the necessary supplies and transportation when convenient; otherwise the officers in charge of the conscripts will make the necessary contracts payable at Monroe and Opelousas.

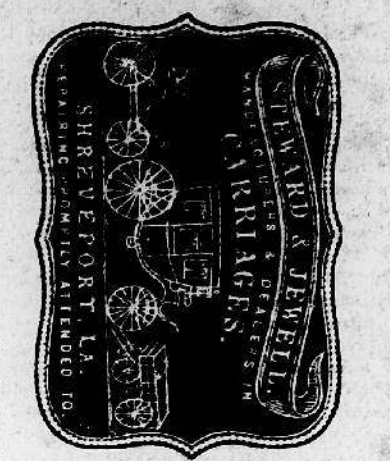

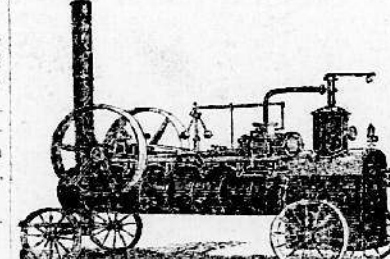
