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NAT'L DRAINAGE CONGRESS GREAT IMPORTANCE TO LA.

State Has 10,000,000 Acres Richest Land In The World That Can Be Reclaimed By Drainage.

New Orleans, March 7, 1912.
 "Every citizen in the State of Louisiana should lead every assistance possible to make the Second National Drainage Congress to be held in this city April 10th to the 13th, one of the most successful gatherings in the history of our State" declared Governor Sanders, who, when he goes out of the Executive Chair next May, will devote his entire time and attention to the various alluvial enterprises in Saint Bernard and other sections of the State.

"Louisiana, as a whole, will be greatly benefited and widely advertised by the holding of this important Convention in the City of New Orleans during one of the most delightful months of the year. We are vitally interested in the subject of reclamation by drainage, for, of the 75,000,000 acres of wet lands in the United States nearly 10,000,000 are in the State of Louisiana.
 "E. L. Chappuis, with whom I have become associated in this great work of developing and reclaiming our waste lands, is now demonstrating the productive value of this character of lands on his large tract in Saint Bernard Parish.

"Edward Visner, Pioneer in reclamation of our wet lands has demonstrated the agricultural and horticultural value of these lands when brought under cultivation.
 "Mr. Chappuis and Mr. Visner are not the only men in this business of showing what the agricultural possibilities are in our State," continued Governor Sanders. "There are scores of other citizens in this work, and I do not believe that there is any doubt but that hundreds of others will follow along this line. In a comparatively short time, the wet and waste lands of Louisiana will be under cultivation.

"Every indication points to a remarkable increase in our population in the next ten years.

"Louisiana is today, one of the best advertised States in the Union. This is due largely to the activity of some of our public-spirited citizens, and to the very effective Publicity Campaign that is being carried on by the New Orleans Board of Control of the National Drainage Congress, and the Chicago office of this Association which is under the direction of Mr. Edmund T. Perkins, Acting President of the National Drainage Congress, an association organized for the purpose of developing the States that have large areas of land lying idle because of too much water.

"Louisiana has approximately 28,000,000 acres with not quite 6,000,000 acres under cultivation. The bringing of more land under cultivation is a vital and important subject to all of our people. A subject in which every man and woman in our State should take an active interest. Our soil is fertile and productive and with the proper efforts, we can induce a thrifty and intelligent class of farming people to come and locate on our lands, where they will find not only a soil productive and abundant in its yield, but a climate that is delightful to live in.
 "Every citizen in Louisiana is interested in making the Second National Drainage Congress to be held in New Orleans in April, such a success that it will attract the attention and admiration of the whole country."

Dr. Dowling Waging War on Insanitary Conditions of New Orleans Restaurants.

In the battle against dirt and disease in Louisiana, the Board of Health's guns are now trained on the ancient barricades of the Crescent City.

The warfare began last August when a report of conditions was made to the Mayor and local health officers by Dr. Oscar Dowling, President of the State Board of Health.

In accordance with the policy of the Board to leave the remedy of sanitary conditions as far as possible to the people of the community, nothing more was done for five months.

A second inspection begun the latter part of February convinced Doctor Dowling that little if any improvement had been made. As a result out of ninety or more places inspected, eighty restaurants, cafes, bar room lunch counters were closed within three days with orders not to re-open until conditions were reported satisfactory by the inspectors.

There are yet hundreds of eating places to visit. It is the purpose of the Board to have the work continue until all have been passed upon.

The managers of the reputable places so far inspected have expressed a willingness to comply with the law.

Potatoes for Early Market.

A Lake Charles firm who took the matter up of shipping potatoes with northern produce dealers recently has received a reply as follows:
Your letter of a recent date was received and we note fully what you say, in which you state that a great many potatoes will be planted in your section this year. We are pleased to hear this and will state that you won't have any trouble in placing them in this market when they are ready to move.

"We can use all you can plant down there, providing you can plant the right kind, and when the crop is ready to move you put them up in the right shape.
"In the first place you want to plant the right kind, which would be the Red Bliss triumph, then when the crop is ready to move, these potatoes should be put in sacks containing about 100 pounds, well sorted and screened so that they are clean and not all full of dirt. They should be sorted so that the stock runs nice and even.

"If you had had any experience or your people would know how to put them up and would guarantee to put them up right, we would take a chance and buy your crop even now."

The Irish potato crop here the past season was a failure and for the past several months those on the local market have never sold for less than \$2 per bushel.
Sweet potatoes are not sufficient here now to meet even the local demand.—Lake Charles American Press.
