THE PEABODY INSTITUTE

The Peabody Institute, held in our town this week, has proven a grand success both instructively and socially. The professors in charge, Messrs. R. L. Himes, C. C. Harris, and R. G. Ferguson can well feel proud of the result of their labors. The vast auditorium of the Thibodaux Opera House was graced with the manhood and womanhood, with the loveliness and beauty of our people, who listened with marked attention to the instructive and interesting lectures delivered by these learned exponents of public education.

The institute was called to order on last Monday morning at 9 a. m. by Capt. R. R. McBride who explained its objects. Judge A. F. Knobloch was called upon to preside and Miss Ezel Stuart to act as secretary. The program for the week was as follows:

Monday day session: Opening Remarks, School Organization, Language, A Study of Educational Principles, and the Verb.

Monday, night session: Welcome Address by Hon. W. E. Howell, responded to by Prof. R. L. Himes; Concert under the able management of Prof. E. Chol; Music by the Home Circle Orchestra under the leadership of Dr. J. J. Daigre.

Tuesday, day session: Grammar, Writing, History of Arithmetic in the United States, Language and Grammar and their Correlation, and the most important principles of Arithmetic.

Tuesday, night session: Grand Concert under the management of Prof. Chol. Address by Judge A. F. Knobloch, a riddle on words; address by Prof. P. H. Maroney on Current Literature, Public Schools 60 years ago by Maj. S. T. Grisamore, and Hoop Drill by the pupils of Mount Carmel Convent.

Wednesday, day session: Fractions, Orthography, Writing, Involutions and Evolution, and Composition.

Wednesday, night session: Exhibition and recitations by the children of "Gaiety Academy" under the leadership of Prof. A. F. Knobloch, principal, and assistants Misses Clara Levrone and Mary Laforeat. Music by Home Circle Orchestra.

Thursday, day session: Primary Reading, Physiology applied in the School Room, Diagramming, Mind Studies and History Methods.

Thursday, night session: A Comedy entitled "The Private Secretary by the Men of Mirth, assisted by professional artists.

Friday, day session: Primary Geography, Charts, School Discipline, Intermediate Geography, and the Recitation.

Friday, night session: The End of Education, and a grand Concert, ably managed by Prof. E. Chol, concluding with a grand Soirée Dansante.

About 125 teachers from the parishes of Assumption, Lafourche and Terrebonne attended the institute, and if they have listened to and harvested up in their mental granary the good and solid teachings of the grand educators of this Peabody Institute, they have returned home much better prepared to attend to the various duties of the school room, rich with the necessary ingredients that constitute the useful and successful teacher.

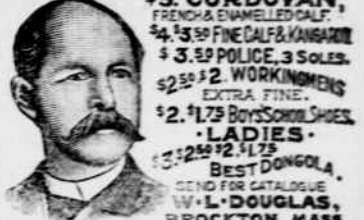
