Heretofore it has been the practice of The Morgan City Daily Review to be very generous in sending papers free to advertisers, advertising agents, public and charitable institutions, officials and others.

The present shortage of white paper makes it almost impossible for publishers to secure supplies sufficient to take care of our regular paid subscribers, and are therefore compelled to announce that we cut off all free copies of every kind after August 19th.

Not only has the price of white paper advanced from 20 to 200 per cent, and more, but the manufacturers are all urging publisher everywhere to economize in every way possible, as supplies are limited and prices are bound to go much higher.

According to the Times-Picayune, publishers of all daily paper of New York and Brooklyn have determined to reduce the size of their papers and to cut all free circulation and to take other drastic action to curtail the consumption of news print paper. The publishers of many other cities have taken similar steps, not only in reducing the daily amount of paper used but in raising subscription prices in order to meet the continual advance in paper cost.

To meet this situation and to avoid serious financial loss, The Review finds it necessary to fall in line with the protective measures that are being so generally adopted throught the country.
