

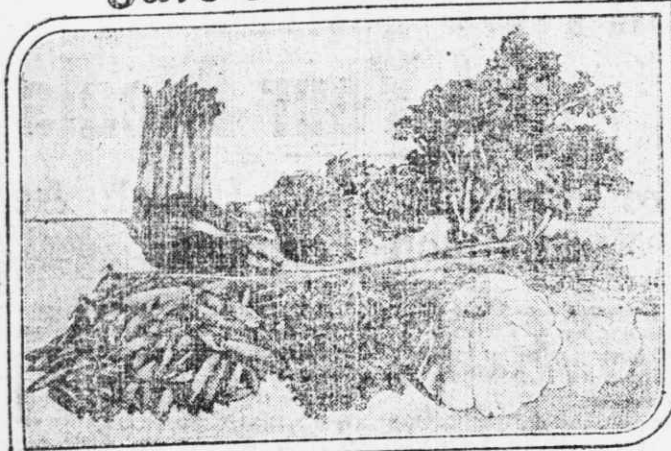

### PROPER STORAGE WILL SAVE SWEET POTATOES

VALUE OF CROP OFTEN DECREASED BY CARELESS METHODS OF HANDLING.

### STORE IN WELL BUILT HOUSE

An Abandoned Tenant House Can Very Often Be Utilized For This Purpose.

Improper methods of harvesting and storing sweet potatoes are responsible for large losses which greatly decrease the value of the crop, according to A. F. Kidder, professor of agronomy, Louisiana State University. Louisiana's sweet potato crop for this year is estimated to be 5,000,000 bushels, and growers would do well to take precautions against undue losses through careless handling.

Some of the things to be observed are as follows:

1. Potatoes should be thoroughly mature before being harvested.
2. They should be handled carefully to prevent bruises, as such places cause rot very quickly.
3. Injured potatoes should not be stored with sound ones.
4. The potatoes should be subjected to a temperature of 85 to 95 degrees Fahrenheit as soon as they are put away, and the moisture content reduced to 10 per cent or less.
5. Potatoes should be stored in a well built house, where the temperature can be kept uniform. This will save a large per cent of all good sound potatoes, while the old bank method usually causes a loss of 25 to 50 per cent. Old tenant houses can often be utilized for that purpose.
