## Farm Bureau Organization

- ### VITAL FARM BUREAU FACTS.
1. It is absolutely non-political, non-class and non-sectarian.
  2. It is not anti- or revolutionary in any way.
  3. It is not opposed to any other farm organization or to any necessary business.
  4. It organizes the farmers and puts them on a business basis to do business.
  5. It works for better and cheaper production and improved living conditions.
  6. It stimulates the machinery for the cooperative marketing of all farm products.
  7. It is organized, operated and financed by the farmers themselves.
  8. It asks for no special privileges or class of legislation.
  9. It is at once the most progressive, the most representative and the most powerful organization ever devised by the farm people.

### BELIEVES IN EDUCATION.

The Farm Bureau stands strongly for the broad, practical education of the people on the farms. It is in harmony with agricultural, academic, teaching and research, but insists that such teaching and research be at once translated into practical form for use on the farms. The Farm Bureau also stands for consolidated, country high schools in order that the boys and girls of the country may enjoy the same educational advantages enjoyed by the children of the cities. The American Farm Bureau Organization in its national headquarters at Chicago maintains departments of education, transportation, legislation, finance, taxation, statistics, research, through its own publication and the press it gives to the farmers first hand information regarding national affairs and keeps him posted on agricultural undertakings. This gives the farmer a clear insight into matters affecting his interest in every part of the nation.

### VALUE OF CO-OPERATION.

The Farm Bureau in using its entire force and energy to combine the farmer that without co-operation he cannot hope to build a prosperous, profitable agriculture. A great fund of information along this line has been collected from Europe, California and various sections of the United States, showing how individual and community failures and how collective effort has succeeded. The Farm Bureau disseminates this information and the farmer learns that he must adopt sensible, business-like methods and join with his neighbor for economic, intelligent production on one hand and intelligent, economic distribution on the other hand if he is to succeed.

### AS A PARENT ORGANIZATION.

The Farm Bureau, as an organization, does not engage in commercial activities. It neither buys nor sells. It regards cooperative stores as being the lowest form of cooperation. It believes that the farmer already has the biggest business on earth and until they make a complete success of their own undertakings it is folly to attempt a business with which they are unfamiliar. But the Farm Bureau does insist that the distribution of agricultural products is just as important to the farmer as is the production of such products; that the farmer will not obtain a fair return on his labor and investment until he retains control of his product from the time it leaves the farm until it reaches the ultimate market.

Hence the Farm Bureau undertakes and does set up subsidiary commodity organizations for the collective marketing of agricultural products. Its purpose is to eliminate waste and speculation; to standardize packing and packing and stabilize prices. There will be no fixing of an arbitrary price but the Farm Bureau insists that the farmer is as justly entitled to reasonable profit on his undertakings as is the manufacturer, the railroad, merchant or banker. Without such profit, American agriculture cannot live, and the failure of the basic industry will bring universal destruction, ruin and demoralization to both society and our national life.
