CITIZENS PETITION COUNCIL ASK FOR IMPROVEMENT OF VIADUCT. A few days ago a committee of Algiers citizens called at the City Hall to present to Mayor Behrman and the City Council a petition asking that the Newton Street viaduct be repaired and the roadway put in condition for safe travel. In the absence of Mayor Behrman the petition was presented to Commissioner Stone who told the committee that the matter would be taken up Tuesday night at the meeting of the council. The petition was taken to the city by Dr. Wm. H. Weaver, Jules Bodenger, and John P. Verzie. The petition to the council is as follows: "To the Honorable, the Mayor, and Commission Council of the City of New Orleans: "Gentlemen:—"We, the undersigned residents of the Fifth District of this city, having knowledge of the condition of the viaduct over M. L. & T. yards at Newton Street, and appreciating the dangerous condition of the roadway over which vehicles have to travel upon said viaduct, and feeling that the present condition of same is such as to endanger the lives of pedestrians because of the unevenness of the planking of said roadway, do petition your honorably body to take such steps as will insure the resurfacing of the vehicle roadway over said viaduct so as to make same safe for tra. e." ALL WOMEN SHOULD REGISTER Weddings of New Orleans Folks

REGISTRATION OFFICE OPEN TEN DAYS LONGER—WOMEN CLERKS ACTING. William A. Bell, registrar, reports an alarming slowness on the part of women to enroll. It has been estimated that at least 20,000 women are eligible to vote in New Orleans. If they all try to respond at the last minute the office will be unable to handle even a small portion of the applicants. The process is simplicity itself. The registration office is open on the second floor of the Washington Artillery Hall, in St. Charles street, two blocks above City Hall, from 5 a. m. to 2 p. m., and from 3 p. m. to 7 p. m. On Saturdays the office is open from 8 a. m. till noon. It will close for the last time before election at noon Saturday, October 2. This is how an applicant goes about registering. She enters the downtown floor of the Washington Artillery Hall, over which a large sign is hung. She climbs a flight of stairs to the second floor, where she will be met by a policeman who is ready to give her any directions desired. Inside the hall is a great rectangle of counters, each appertaining to registration of applicants from certain wards. The applicant finds her counter by the ward number above it, or the officer will find it for her if she is confused. A deputy registrar will provide her with a registration blank, pen and ink, and help her to locate her precinct. On the blank she fills in her ward, her precinct, her residence with the streets bounding the square on which she lives. Stating herself to be a citizen of the state of Louisiana, she fills in her name, her birthplace (state, parish or county), her age in years, months or days, with the date of her birth; the length of residence in state, parish, ward and precinct and her party affiliation, color, occupation and sex. The registrar examines the form, requests the applicant to raise her right hand and asks if she solemnly swears that all she has written is true to her best knowledge. She replies: "I do," signs her name in the official record and receives a certificate that bears both her signature and that of the registrar. The first election in which women can vote in Louisiana will be that of November 2, when they will have a voice in the presidential election and the choice of three new members of the Orleans Parish School Board. No poll tax is required of women at the first registration. AMATEUR BASEBALL. The Sunset Stars made their first appearance Sunday by defeating the Viaduct Rangers by a score of 9 to 3. T.
