

A SCRIPTURAL PANORAMA.
 Mark Twain, in the Alta Californian tells the following entertaining history of the Scriptural panorama:
 There was a fellow traveling in that country with a moral religious law—a sort of a Scriptural panorama—and he hired a wooden-head old slab to play the piano for him. After the first night's performances the showman said: "My friend you seem to know pretty much all the tunes, and you worry along first-rate. But then didn't you notice sometimes last night, the piece that you happened to be playing was a little tough on the properties, so to speak—didn't seem to jibe with the general gait of the picture that was passing at the time, as it were—as you didn't follow suit nor trump, you understand."
 "Well, no," the fellow said. "He had n't noticed it, but it might; he had played along just as it came."
 So they put it up so that the simple old dummy was to keep his eyes on the picture after that, and so soon as a stunning picture rolled out, he was to fit it to a dot with a piece of music that would help the audience to get an idea of the subject; and warm them up like a camp meeting revival. That sort of thing would corral their sympathies, the showman said.
 There was a big audience on that night—mostly middle-aged and old people, who belonged to the church and took a strong interest in Bible matters, and balance were young bucks and heifers—they always came out strong on panoramas, you know, because it gives them a chance to kiss one another's mugs in the dark.
 Well, the showman began to swell himself up for this lecture, and the old muddobber tackled the piano, and ran his fingers up and down once or twice to see that she was all right, and the feller behind the curtain began to grind out the pictures. The showman balanced his weight on his right foot, dropped his hands on his hips, flung his eyes on the scenery, and said:
 "Ladies and gentlemen, the painting now before you illustrates the beautiful and touching parable of the Prodigal Son. Observe the happy expression breaking over the features of the poor, suffering youth, worn and weary from his long march; notice also ecstasy beaming from the uplifted countenance of the aged father, and the joy that sparkles in the eyes of the excited group of youths and maidens, and seems ready to burst in a welcome chorus from their lips. The lesson, my friends, is as solemn and instructive as the story is tender and beautiful."
 The muddobber was all ready, and at the conclusion of the speech, struck up:
 "Oh, we'll all get blind drunk,
 When Johnny comes marching home!"
 Some of the people giggled, and some groaned a little. The showman could not say a word. He looked at the piano man sharp, but he was all lovely and serene—he didn't know there was anything out of gear.
 The panorama moved on:
 "Ladies and gentlemen, the fine picture now unfolding itself to your gaze, exhibits one of the notable events of Bible history—our Savior and his upon the sea of Galilee. Ho how awe-inspiring are the revelations which the subject invokes!"
 All around the house they were peering. "Oh, how lovely, and the orchestra let him in."
