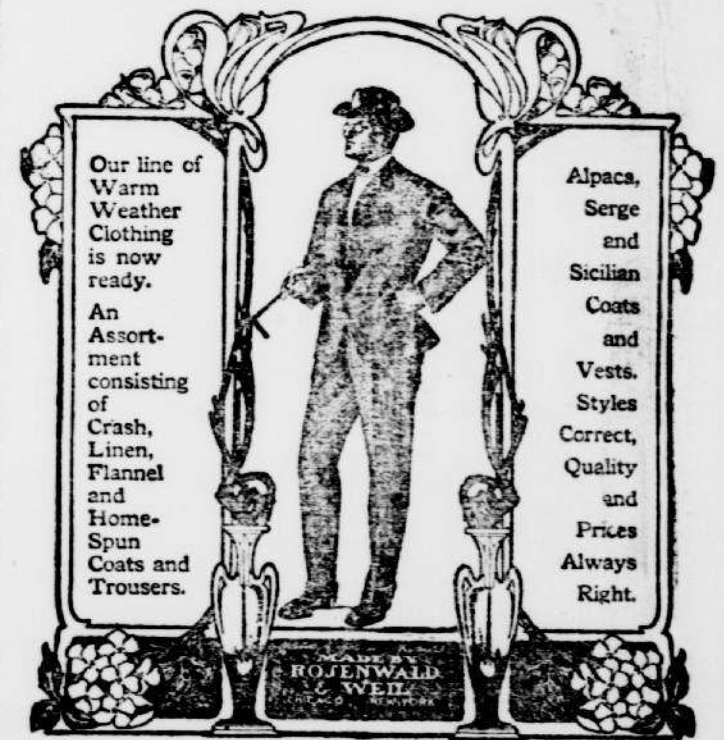

THE STATE OF LOUISIANA.

20th JUDICIAL DISTRICT COURT.
PARISH OF LAFOURCHE.

Be it known and remembered, That on this fifth day of the month of August, in the year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and three,

Pursuant to written notices issued by the Clerk of Court, in and for the Parish of Lafourche, and addressed and given to each of the Jury Commissioners, in and for said Parish, as by the said Clerk's certificate hereto annexed more fully appears; we Henry W. Frost, Henry Riviere, and John S. Seely, a majority of the Jury Commissioners, duly appointed as such for the parish of Lafourche under the provisions of Act No. 135 of the General Assembly, approved July 13th, 1898, and promulgated by publication in the State Official Journal on July 23rd, 1898, and all duly sworn and qualified as such Jury Commissioners, in and for the parish of Lafourche, met at the Clerk's Office at the Court House in the town of Thibodaux, and in company with P. Wallace Lefort, Clerk of said Court, ex-officio Jury Commissioner, duly sworn and qualified as such. Then and there in the presence of Messrs. J. Otis Knoblock and Emile J. Legendre, two good and competent and disinterested witnesses of lawful age, competent to read and write the English language, residing in the parish of Lafourche, and summoned by the Clerk of said Court for the purpose, proceeded in accordance with Section 6 of said Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1898, to examine the general venire list on file in the clerk's office, and having struck therefrom the names of such grand jurors and petit jurors as have so served, as well as the names of others who are known to have died, removed from the parish, become exempt or disqualified to serve as jurors since their names were entered thereon, and the names of those who have died, removed, become exempt or disqualified were also taken from the general venire box, after which we supplemented the original list and the ballots in the box, with the names of the same number of good and competent men from the qualified jurors of the parish, as have been taken from the box and entered from the list, so as to keep the number of names in the general venire box and on the jury list at the original standard of three hundred contained therein; each of said names so placed in the general venire box having been written by the said clerk on a separate slip of paper, together with the number of the ward or place of residence of such person.

And immediately after completing said venire list, we selected therefrom the names of the following twenty citizens, good and competent men, possessing the qualifications to serve as grand jurors prescribed by Section 1 of said Act, taken from the different parts of the parish, as far as practicable, to serve as grand jurors at the session of Court beginning on Monday, September 14th, 1903, and until discharged according to law, to-wit:

And having so selected the above named persons as grand jurors, the names of each was written on a separate slip of paper by the Clerk in the presence of the Commissioners and the witnesses, and all the slips so containing the names and number of the ward of each of said grand jurors were placed in an envelope by us commissioners, which was by us sealed, signed and endorsed, and labeled, "List of Grand Jurors", and placed in the Jury Box as hereinafter stated.

After which we proceeded, after the slips contained in the general venire box had been well mixed, to draw from the said general venire box the names of thirty persons to serve as petit jurors for the first week of the session of said court, beginning on Monday, September 14th, 1903, the names being drawn from the box one at the time by Henry Riviere, one of the said Jury Commissioners, in the presence of the other commissioners and of the witnesses, and which so drawn are as follows:

And thereupon we have placed the said two sealed envelopes together with the sealed envelope containing a list of grand jurors selected as hereinabove set forth, in a box provided for the purpose, labeled Jury Box, which was thereupon locked and sealed and placed in the custody and keeping of the Clerk of Court, for use at the next ensuing session of court, and subject to the orders of the District Judge. And the said general venire box was also locked and sealed and delivered to the said Clerk of Court as the custodian thereof, all in the presence of the said witnesses.

"Reverend and Dear Father—With joy do we hear the new received today, that a new Pontiff has been given to the church, in the sacred person of his Eminence, Cardinal Joseph Sarto, the Patriarch of Venice, who, as the successor of Peter shall henceforth be known under the name of Pius X.

"Whilst our hearts will ever cling to the memory of the illustrious Leo, whose life has shown forth like a brilliant star in the firmament, we gladly welcome his successor, the newly elected ruler of the Christian world, and bless his name in one seat by God Himself. May his apostolic, opened under the auspices of the great St. Dominic, be also torchlike and diffuse the rays of Heavenly truth to the furthest end of the world! May our new supreme pastor continue the work of his saintly predecessor and console the church, that holy spouse of Christ, charged by Him to carry to the end of time the sublime destinies of mankind.

"We most joyfully received, also today, a message from his excellency, our venerable archbishop, conveying the firm and expressive of his profound satisfaction and his desire that the archbishop of New Orleans, join in the universal thanks offered to God in gratitude for the happy event.

3. That at all the masses the faithful be requested to pray for the successful reign of our new Supreme Pontiff, Pius X.
