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Work of Sheriff.

Following some picking of pockets at the West Oxford fair at Fryburg Wednesday, one unexpected party was arrested and now is awaiting a continued hearing, and three others attended the officers and took to the woods.

Between last past five and six in the afternoon, Sheriff Harry D. Cole, South Paris and Deputy Sheriff Harry O. Stimson of Norway, who had been on the fair grounds during the day, were at the Fryburg railroad station looking for some man whom they had seen on the grounds. They saw four men down the track toward Fryburg, and went to meet them. The men walked rapidly away from them for a while, and then turned and came back. When the parties met Sheriff Cole had some conversation with the men and told them to come back to the station with him, showing his badge when they asked for his authority.

The men who were being killed in time waiting for the train which left about an hour, seemed unwilling to go with the officers, and the latter called for a man to enforce the command. The man whom Stimson took hold of wriggled out of his two coats, leaving them in Stimson's hands, and throwing himself against a rail of the track. The man whom Sheriff Cole took hold of broke away, but Mr. Cole pulled his gun and fired, shooting but bringing each about shooting. The man whom Sheriff Cole took hold of, and the officers secured him and put the handcuffs on him. The man who had meant to go into the cover of the bushes beside the track.

The arrested man was brought to jail, and the next day in the Norway Municipal Court was tried on the charge of larceny from the person. On request of Sheriff Cole, the hearing was adjourned for a week, until Thursday of this week, to enable him to examine witnesses, and bail was fixed at \$400. The prisoner was represented by Louis J. Bran of Lewiston. He expects to secure bail and be released some time Monday.

The prisoner gives the name of Frank Harris. When the officers talked with the men on the railroad track, they said they all came from Portland, but their connections seem to be with Boston rather than Portland. He had seventy dollars in currency in his pockets when arrested.

Tuesday night Deputy Sheriffs Shaw of South Paris and Davis of Bethel captured at Gilead an Overland car containing four people, three men and one woman, all Lithuanians, and eight-quart jars of whiskey. The next day in the Norway Municipal Court two of the men paid each a fine of \$100 and costs for illegal transportation. The other man and the woman were discharged. They were represented by George H. Hutchins of Mexico, and John Wikost of Bethel. The automobile was libeled, the hearing to be held on the 10th.

Hearing in Assault Case.

There was a referee hearing at the court house Saturday before Justice A. M. Spear in the case of Tansilio Zanon against the estate of Tansilio Zanon, deceased, and Louis E. Small of Mexico, in an action of trespass. Bernard A. Bove and Jacob H. Bernier of Portland for the plaintiff; George H. Hutchins and Ralph T. Parker of Ramford for defendants.

The date of the alleged assault is Sept. 20, 1916, and the plaintiff alleges that on the evening of that day the defendants, who were then deputy sheriffs, came to the Zanon house on Pine Street and demanded entrance, and were finally admitted by Mr. Zanon, husband of the plaintiff.
