Launch of the Big Ram at Bath Saturday.

A BANQUET AND SPEECH-MAKING FOLLOWS AT THE ALAMEDA.

Six Thousand People Witness the Interesting Spectacle—Miss Soley Snips the Ribbon Attached to the Wine Bottle—Speeches at the Banquet by Senator Hale, Gen. Hyde, Secretary Soley and Others.

BATH, February 4.—The ram Katahdin went off at precisely 4 o'clock. The Hy e Light Guards fired a national salute at a moment before. Miss Soley was pre- sented with a pair of silver shears by the men of the works with which she shipped the ribbon that held the bottle of wine. It dropped with just force enough to break on the steel ram. The band greeted the Katahdin as she went off. There were about six thousand present, all the buildings being full of people.

The retiring foreman of the boiler department was given a ring. J. O. Shaw paid an eloquent tribute to the Katahdin, its great men, its great industry.

BOSTON, February 5.—The Central Union today, by unanimous vote, adopted a petition to the Senate and House of Representatives of Massachusetts, asking that women legally entitled to vote for school committee be allowed to vote at all city and town elections.

NATIONAL CAPITAL.

The Hawaiian Commissioners Have Presented Their Credentials.

CONGRESS CONTINUES TO MAKE ADD ABOUT NOTHING.

Maine Pensions and Postal Changes—The Hawaiian Envoys Confident of Ultimate Success—The Instructions to Our Navy at Honolulu.

WASHINGTON, February 4.—Secretary Foster made public today the full text of the despatch announcing the Hawaiian revolution received by him from Minister Stevens on the 28th of January by telegraph from San Francisco, and the answer he sent to the minister. The information contained in the despatch sent by Mr. Stevens has already been made public, but the reply of Secretary Foster is herewith given for the first time, as follows:

Your course in recognizing an unopposed de facto government appears to have been discreet and in accordance with the facts. The rule of the government has uniformly been to recognize and enter into relation with any actual government in full possession of effective power with the assent of the people. You will continue to recognize the new government under such conditions.

The Commission and the Secretary.

The first interview between Secretary Foster and the Hawaiian annexation commissioners was held in the diplomatic parlors of the State Department this morning, and lasted half an hour. There were present Secretary Foster and Solicitor Partridge, representing the United States, and Messrs. Thurston, Wilder, Castle, Marsden and Carter, the Hawaiian commissioners; Mr. Kinney of Salt Lake City, who is present with them as a special adviser, and Dr. Mott, the Hawaiian minister, the latter of whom made the introduction.

The Anti-Option Bill.

The agricultural committee met this morning and decided to report the anti-option bill back to the House, non-concurring in the Senate amendments and agreeing to the request of the Senate for a conference thereon. Subsequently Mr. Hatch reported the bill to the House. It is placed on the union calendar, where it must be considered in a committee on the whole.

QUEENSLAND FLOODS.

People Roosting in Trees to Escape the Waters.

THE KING OF THE HELLENES VISITS HIS STRICKEN ISLE.

Launch of the Viking Ship—Further News of the Greek Earthquake—A Conservative Gain in England—Alsace Becoming Reconciled to Germany.

BRIENBRAIN, February 5.—Rain for several days has caused a flood throughout Queensland. The people in low lying districts are suffering greatly. Their houses are submerged to the second floor and the water is still rising. The towns of Bundaberg, Ipswich, and Bundamba are suffering most severely and are threatened with total demolition.

RECONCILED TO GERMANY.

BERLIN, February 4.—A remarkable episode occurred in the Alsation Diet at Strasburg on Thursday, when Deputy Petri, formerly a staunch opponent of the German regime, declared an approving exclamation from many of his colleagues, that the time of the anti-German, or protest party was past. "We have made our peace with the new order of things," he said. He demanded, however, that the province be raised to the rank of an autonomous German federal state.

A Greek Earthquake.

ATHENS, February 4.—The King and Queen of Greece and the Duke of Sparta have started for Corfu, to witness the damage done by the earthquake, and to do what they can for the suffering people. Since yesterday the shocks have been fewer. The loss of property is estimated at 4,000,000, 000 drachmas.

Viking Ship Launched.

CHRISTIANA, February 4.—The Viking ship intended for the Chicago World's Fair, was launched today amid great enthusiasm. Admiral Karén, commander of the Norwegian navy and numerous naval officers were present, as well as a multitude of other persons.

A Conservative Gain.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The Conservatives won a signal victory today by capturing Huddersfield. The contest was for the seat made vacant by the death of William Summers, Liberal. It was bitterly contested, and largely on the Irish home rule issue. Sir Joseph Croxall was elected today by 7085 votes to 6038 for Wood, Liberal. At the late general elections Summers, Liberal, had 7098 votes to 8857 for Crosland.

Murdered a Witness.

ROME, February 4.—A Palermo paper says the murder of Signor Nottarobaro yesterday, was part of a plot to suppress evidence concerning the bank scandal. Nottarobaro was long director of the bank of Sicily and as such got possession of many documents including persons of high influence. These documents were in his satchel when he was killed but are now missing.

Crawling Out of It.

PANAMA, February 5.—The Intantsin publishes a dispatch from Henri Roehfort, in which he refuses the humiliation of returning to France with a safe conduct for the purpose of testifying in the Panama case.

Lake Superior Frozen for Thirty Miles.

DULUTH, Minn., February 4.—Lake Superior is frozen thirty miles from the shore, something which has not occurred so early in the winter for fifteen years. The ice is fully two feet thick near the shores. Unless heavy snow falls, and there is an early spring, the opening of navigation at Duluth and Sault canal, where the ice is also unusually heavy, will be late.

Canada Wants to Come In.

WINDSOR, Ont., February 5.—A large political meeting at Essex, seven miles from here, last night, discussed the future of Canada. The vote resulted to remain in status quo 21, independence 12, imperial federation 3, political union with the United States 43. The vote is a fair expression of the prevailing sentiment.

Lowering the Skating Record.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., February 4.—John S. Johnson today lowered the five mile amateur skating record, covering the distance in 15.20. Donoghue's record for the same distance is 15.362. Haggan's 15.11, professional.
