### Who Can Vote at School meetings?

SESSION LAWS 1881.  
Page 155—Section 103. No person, except an elector, as aforesaid, shall be eligible to any elective office contemplated in this chapter; *Provided, however,* That any female person of or above the age of twenty-one years, who has resided in this State three months, and in this township ten days next preceding any election shall be eligible to the office of school inspector.

Page 168—Section 17. Every person of the age of twenty-one years, who has property liable to assessment for school taxes in any school district, and who has resided therein three months next preceding any school meeting held in said district, or who has resided three months next preceding such meeting on any territory belonging to such district at the time of holding said meeting, shall be a qualified voter in said meeting upon all questions, and all persons who are twenty-one years of age, and are the parents or legal guardians of any children included in the school census of the district, and who have, for three months as aforesaid, been residents in said district or upon any territory belonging thereto at the time of holding any school meeting, shall be entitled to vote on all questions arising in said district which do not directly involve the raising of money by tax.

Page 171—Section 4. Any qualified voter in a school district who has property liable to assessment for school taxes shall be eligible to election or appointment to office in such school district, unless such person be an alien.
