## NOTICE TO FARMERS

In order that those interested may know in what favor the buggies sold by other dealers (of foreign manufacture) stand in this community we refer you to the following bugle sold to Ashley Denton, John Garber, Wm. H. Doyle, W. D. Ross, Chas. Unsworth, Wm. McLaughlin. Some of these parties have been to us during the season to have their buggies repaired and repainted. We ask them why they don't get them repaired where they bought them. They say the present agent claims that owing to the fact that the spent last year sold them, nothing can be done by him in the way of repairs, although they were warranted for two years by the same firm—Marquette Leader. It would be well for the farmers in this community to make a note of this when wanting a buggy, wagon or set of harness. You will save money by buying of home men and encourage home industries instead of buying of parties who are here to-day and away to-morrow. They are not the ones who will build up the town and foster new enterprises but tend to smother out what we already have by selling a spurious article at half price, not only ruining our honest tradesman, but robbing the farmers at large. Our town is fast becoming notorious as a place where any "snayde" article can be palmed off on the unsuspecting stranger. We trust the farmers will begin to open their eyes to the fact that it pays better by far to patronize a substantial home manufacture.

## The P H & N W collision.

The collision on the Saginaw division of the Port Huron & Northwestern Railway, Monday, was the first accident of the kind that has ever occurred on the road. The train westward, in charge of conductor S. P. Mann, left Marquette three minutes behind time, but reached the curve in the woods a short distance east of Mayville a few minutes ahead of time. The work train in charge of conductor E. B. Doolittle had just been unloading gravel and was about to back up, when No. 12 came around the curve, and in an instant the locomotives struck each other. Both engineers and firemen had time to jump off, and did so without injury. Conductor Doolittle was standing in the side door of the caboose, which was coupled to the locomotive, and was looking towards the rear of his train. He did not see or hear the approaching train, and as the locomotives struck each other the flat car next to the caboose was driven through the latter car, catching both of Doolittle's legs, crushing them terribly. No one else on either train was injured, and none of the cars on conductor Mann's train were damaged to any considerable extent. It appears that conductor Doolittle did not send out a man to flag the train known to be nearly due, as he should have done, and to this neglect, and the fact that conductor Mann's train was a few minutes ahead of time, this disaster is to be charged. Both locomotives were so badly damaged that it will take several weeks to repair them, and the company will be considerably embarrassed for motive power in their construction work in consequence. The wreck was cleared away during the night and the damaged locomotives and cars are now in the repair shops in this city. Conductor Doolittle's injuries are very severe, but not necessarily fatal although a fatal result is to be feared. Drs. C. M. and C. B. Stockwell do not think amputation desirable, as it would almost certainly result fatally. Mr Doolittle is cared for at Mayville.—Port Huron Times.
