—The Armaida Fair was a success, as usual. This year they had the best display since the organization of the society. Under the management of the general secretary, J. E. Barringer, this society has obtained the greatest success of any to ush up fair we know of. The total number of entries made were 2,453, the total receipts were over \$1,400. There were about 6,000 people on the grounds the last day. Everything passed off smoothly, and we predict for the society many years of success.

BROCKWAY FAIR!

The eighth annual fair of the Brockway District Agricultural Society was held on the society's grounds in Brockway, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of last week. The weather was all that could be asked for, the entries exceeded those of last year, there being over 900 in all departments, the attendance was very large, the receipts likewise, and, in fact, the fair was a grand success.

As one reached the grounds he hardly knew where to go first, but we will make mention of matters and things as they were classified in the premium lists.

In cattle the exhibit was good, there being 32 entries. Among the exhibitions was noticed a thoroughbred Durham bull, by Isaac Curry, one by Wm Shannon and one by E. E. Bowman. Grade cattle by J. W. Gustin, Jas Foley, Jos Eastman, D. C. Smith, A. E. Shearer and others. Native cattle by J. W. Gustin, E. A. Gustin, Andrew Ballhoff and a number of others. In working cattle, Jos Eastman and Wm Morgan showed the best yokes. In the class for steers, Chas Presley's and James Foley's took the first premiums.

The exhibition of horses was very large, there being 120 entries. It seems to be the pride of the farmers in the Township of Brockway to own good horses, and they also take a great deal of pride in showing them. We have space only to mention the better ones. In the class for stallions and fillies for all work, was noticed D. C. Eck, stallion, Charles Tappe, 3-yr-old stallion, L. Brown, 3-yr-old stallion, Wm Scott a fine 2-yr-old stallion, and a large number of yearlings and 2-yr-old stallions by different parties. For general purpose horse, Wm White showed a fine roadster stallion, and Sweetman & Clemens a good carriage horse. For heavy draught horses J. Glossow, D. McKenzie and J. A. Vincent showed the best horses, two years old, while Jas Sterling, John Smith and J. Kane exhibited young stallions. Eugene Kiely showed his fine draught team which was debarred from taking a premium, having taken first last year.

The show of sheep was extra good this year there being 50 entries. The exhibition included Cotswolds, Leicesters, Merinos and Lincolns. Geo. Sanderson, D. McKenzie and E. P. Parsons had the best display, although others were worthy of mention.

The display of swine was small. There were 11 entries and divided among Berkshires, Poland China and grays.

The exhibition of poultry was very fair there being 35 entries including light brahmas, buff cochin, black spanish, leghorns, dorkins, Hamburgs, plymouth rocks, in chickens, beside geese, turkeys and ducks.

In agricultural implements the display was very large. The principal exhibitors were Chas Grieb, of Port Huron, Jas Cogley, of Emmet, Wm R. Gillett, of Riley Centre.

W. & J. Harris had a splendid display of their celebrated make of wagons and buggies. J. D. Vivian, of this place, had a nice display of carriages and wagons; T. Darcy & Co. took the first premium for an oiled wagon.

The fruit and vegetable departments were well filled by these farm products, which goes to show that this district is well up in fruit growing. One thing we noticed particularly was the effect the cold weather of September had had on fruit, especially on grapes, they not having ripened thoroughly, simply having changed in color, not taste.

In the fancy goods department the display was very extensive. Quills, coverlets, worsted and crochet work, embroidery and such like, hung about in profusion and of that kind that takes the prizes, too. On the west end of floral hall we noticed a very fine display of cut flowers which were very beautifully arranged into bouquets, plates, etc. We are sorry to say that our space will not permit us to mention the exhibitors.

The last day's sports included horse races which were called shortly after 2 o'clock in the afternoon.
