THE CITY.

Judge Brown speaks at the Town Hall Saturday evening.

Republican county convention will be held at Town Hall this afternoon.

Hon. H. H. Hatch speaks at the Town Hall Thursday evening of next week.

The Knights of Labor held a large meeting at Kessler's Hall Monday evening.

All indications point to a Waterloo for the Democracy a week from next Tuesday in Ohio.

Dr. Chas. A. Perrin is erecting a residence on Huron street. Quay & Son have the contract.

John Goulden who has been very sick at Port Huron, we are pleased to learn is getting better.

The propeller Messenger had to go into dry dock at Chicago, to have her stern bearings tightened.

James G. Blaine is receiving a grand ovation wherever he visits during his trip west. The people, are with him, and the people will elect him in November.

A caucus will be held in the council room Saturday evening to elect delegates from the township of Benton to the National Greenback Labor county convention.

Thursday evening of next week Hon. H. H. Hatch, representative in Congress from this district will address our citizens on the political issues of the day at the Town Hall.

It is probable Blaine will spend three days in Michigan. He will speak in Detroit on the evening of the 14th, in Grand Rapids on the evening of the 15th and then at Saginaw or Bay City the next evening.

The San Antonio (Texas) Daily Times of Sept. 26th contains the following: Mrs. A. Brown, of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., arrived here yesterday. She goes to Boerne to join her husband, who came South a few months ago for his health. She is stopping at the St. Leonard.

The Ohio state election takes place one week from next Tuesday. The indications are that the Democracy will come to grief and the Republicans have a rousing majority. The Democratic papers concede that the state will go Republican but say anything less than 25,000 majority will not count.

The masons have the second story of St. Mary's school building nearly up. It is going to be quite a tasty building. The saps and cornice are of red brick, and make a very pleasing contrast with cream colored brick of the main walls.

The grand masquerade party at the skating rink will take place Friday evening of next week. Good music will be in attendance, and Messrs Gero & Smyth will see that everything is done to make the party a pleasant success in every respect.

Contracts for the building of ten sections of the Beaugrand ditch were let last Saturday, and the letting of the remaining nine sections was postponed until next Saturday at 10 o'clock a. m., at the same place. Contractors please bear this in mind.

Yesterday was the first day of the season that deer could be lawfully killed. Some of the sportsmen of the county evidently set up all night in order to get an early start as day had hardly dawned before several fine carcasses were exhibited on the streets for sale.

We understand that the Michigan Central railroad will not take off the night train the coming winter. It is stated that the management have concluded that it will be a matter of economy to keep it running, as it will cost much less with the additional trains running, to keep the road open during the snows of winter. We trust the information may be reliable. Cheboygan missed the night train very much last winter.

James J. Brown left on the City of Cleveland yesterday for Detroit. He will return to attend the special term of court to be called after the presidential election.

The Blaine and Logan club meeting last Thursday evening at the Town Hall was well attended, and Messrs. Perkins, Frost and Bell delivered some forcible speeches that were logical and convincing.

We understand that S. O. Fisher, fusion candidate for Congress in this district, will join the caravansary here as one of the attractions of the great "what is it" show that is advertised to appear in Cheboygan next Tuesday.

We hear that the Democracy have proposed to Nationals to use their influence to secure the nomination of M. A. McHenry, of Indian River, as a fusion candidate for representative, if the latter will give them the county ticket.

Rev. H. C. Northrup, the new pastor of the M. E. church, writes that he will be here on the City of Cleveland next Saturday. He may therefore be expected to preach his first sermon Sunday morning. His congregation should make a special effort to be present in force to welcome him to his new pastorate.

Judge Charles R. Brown will address the citizens of Cheboygan on the political issues of the day at the Town Hall next Saturday evening. The Judge is a ready and forcible speaker and whenever he has addressed the people he has aroused the greatest of enthusiasm. We speak for a good audience to hear him next Saturday evening.

J. P. Sutton, deputy county clerk says that owing to the probable adjournment of the circuit court until after the presidential election it will be necessary for all those desiring to secure their naturalization papers to be present promptly at the opening of the court on Tuesday the 14th, as Judge Ramsdell will probably remain only a short time in town.

The county poor board had their annual settlement last week, and the gratifying result was that notwithstanding a much greater number of poor had been cared for and their needs supplied than last year, the expense had been some \$200 less than the amount appropriated. This speaks well for the members of the board, and shows that this department has been successfully managed.

The law against killing deer expired Tuesday at midnight, and the mighty Nimrods were out at the break of day yesterday morning after their venison. The first carcass brought to town was an exhibition at Spooner's meat market at 6 a. m., and was killed by Theodore Myers in his pea field in Duncan Township. Myers is a crack shot and generally has venison as soon as any of them when the season opens.

Wm. Devine has returned from Manistique, and says the citizens of that place offered him considerable inducement to go up and start a stage line from that town to the railroad. He passed over the road and says it is fully as good as the road between Cheboygan and Petoskey, over which an immense amount of travel passed for a number of years prior to the completion of the Michigan Central railroad to this place.

James Barclay returned from Dakota last Saturday evening, and will remain the coming winter in Cheboygan. He reports the Cheboygan people in Dakota all flourishing. Barney Mullen is farming and this season raised five acres of corn which, Mr. Barclay says will average fifty bushels to an acre and is worth over fifty cents per bushel. F. M. Sammons and family are well. Mr. Sammons in addition to running his livery business has taken the contract for building a new school house to cost \$2200. Mr. Barclay says the rapid settlement of that country is wonderful all the available land in the region the Cheboygan people located being taken up.

Come out and hear a good speech from Congressman Hatch, of this district, at the Town Hall next Thursday night.

Prof. Barr has designated Miss Zaide Adams as editor in chief and Miss Dora Ramsay as assistant editor for the next number of "The Echo," the school paper.

Penny & Frost, the new dry goods firm have got in their new shelves, new counters and new goods, and are wanting their old and new customers to call and see them.

There are two cases from Cheboygan county on the Supreme Court docket for the October term. Number 91 is Gifford vs McArthurs. Number 92 is Perry vs The Village of Cheboygan. There are 142 cases on the docket.

After a very successful season's run W. & A. McArthur shut down their saw mill Saturday evening for the season. The stagnation in the lumber market and the fact that their piling room was about all occupied probably accounts for their shutting down so early in the season.

There is an interesting family quarrel among some of the residents in the Black river region. Arrests have been made, bad stories told, hard names called and considerable evidence of bad blood manifested. The latest development in the case is the poisoning of some cows, Paris green having been used, it is said, and criminal proceedings against some of the parties is likely to result.

We are in receipt of No. 1 vol. 1 of the Sunday Express, published at Detroit with John W. Leonard, editor and C. H. Melsaac business manager. The salutatory says it is not published to fill "a long felt want," but from the conviction that there was an opening in the metropolis of Michigan for a bright, new Sunday paper. The paper before us is a very readable one, and the proprietors have our best wishes for success.

The chances are that the October term of court will be by Judge Ramsdell and adjourned until after the Presidential election. The attorneys yesterday agreed to such an adjournment and a telegram was sent Judge Ramsdell requesting him to notify Sheriff Harrington not to summon the jury at present. The term will probably be held the latter part of November or the first of December, as best suits the convenience of the Judge. The Judge will be here at the regular time as there are some prisoners awaiting sentence, and will open court for the purpose of passing sentences and then adjourn, as requested.

Rev. T. B. Leith preached his farewell sermon at the M. E. Church last Sunday evening. The estimation in which he was held by his congregation was evinced by the large congregation that was present, notwithstanding the rainy evening to listen to his farewell words. He preached a very interesting discourse and gave a brief resume of the work that had been accomplished during his pastorate, showing the amount of money raised for the different church purposes and how it had been expended and the number added to the membership of the church. Mr. and Mrs. Leith and family left for their new field of labor, at Harrisville yesterday on the City of Cleveland.

F. M. Sammons, the father of Greenbackism in Cheboygan county, has blossomed out into a full fledged Republican out in Dakota. He was long a leading Democrat in this county, but some years ago took up with the Greenback doctrine. He probably got his eyes open by seeing how the young territory, with whom he has identified himself, was treated by the Democratic House. Dakota, with a population of 600,000, a territory that the income of the postoffices more than pays the postal expenses expended by the general government for the benefit of its citizens, which is more than two-thirds of the states do, knocked at the door of the House and asked for admittance as a state, a privilege they were justly entitled to, but the Democratic majority, with an utter disregard of justice, refused to admit them, the only reason being the fact that the territory is Republican by a large majority. Oh! yes, the Democrats are dear friends of the people—when they think they can get their votes, but when the votes would count on the other side, as in Dakota, their regard for the rights of the people cease. It is ever thus with Democracy.
