Film Shows Advancements Made By Race In Science

"The Negro in Science," a fascinating behind-the-scenes film of the remarkable activities of members of the race in the research laboratories of the world, will be shown at the Alhambra theater beginning Sept. 7th, for 7 days.

One of a series of widely acclaimed documentary films on Negro America, "Science," features Dr. Clarence T. Mason, Director of Research at the Carver Foundation.

Dr. Mason in his film report visits the Carver Foundation at Pegee, the Harlem Hospital in New York, the Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago, the laboratories of Howard University, and opens doors into many other research centers where members of the race are conducting investigations concerning the cause of cancer, polio, certain heart diseases and other medical mysteries.

A part of the film deals with the remarkable plasma discovery of the late Dr. Charles Drew, the food chemistry experiments of the revered Dr. George Washington Carver, and his successors.
