Great Corruption—The Elements stirred up.
If our readers would like to witness the futile and unavailing straggles, writhings, contortions and floundering of a man, when he is convicted of "swindling the people in his official capacity" and of preferring lying charges against others, or so completely entered and nailed to the wall that it is impossible for him to extricate himself, or do the least thing to mitigate his condition, we would recommend to them to read the spasmatic efforts of H. C. Clapp in the last Free Press. He flounders and splurges through two columns of that paper in a vain endeavor to get up a smoke and dust to shield himself from the indignant gaze of the public, without saying one word or offering a particle of proof, to sustain his false claims of the amounts allowed republican sheriffs, or to vindicate himself from the specific charges of fraud and swindling which we have preferred against him.

The pretended comparison of the salaries paid to the County Treasurer and County Clerk, to which he refers, has some ear-marks of fraud. It is well known that every year there are certain expenses incurred by those officers, such as books, for the use of the office, binding of tax lists and returns, express charges on books and blanks, &c., sent to the office; and stationary for the Clerk's office, &c.; which expenses those officers having paid, they present their account for them to the Board of Supervisors when in session and get it allowed. Now, in their comparison alluded to, they have included the amounts thus allowed, in their statement of the amounts allowed the Republican Treasurer and Clerk, while they have excluded the same items, from the amounts which they state as allowed to the Democratic Treasurer and Clerk, stating merely their bare salaries. Can anything be more contemptibly dishonest than such low trickery and fraud. All their attempts to fix upon the Republicans the charge of squandering the county money, are characterized by this same kind of palpable deception and falsehood.

Until H. C. Clapp can extricate himself in some degree from these and other charges of fraud and falsehood, as well as from the charge of swindling the county in his official capacity, all his insane ravings about the "thieving hell-hounds of the court house" will damage nothing but his own cause, and will only exhibit more forcibly his impotent rage at being transfixed with indubitable proof of being guilty of the crime of swindling, which he is vainly endeavoring to fix upon others.
