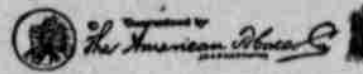

SCHOOL ARTS EXHIBITION

The annual exhibition of work in manual training, sewing, penmanship and art will be held in the Forest Park School Gymnasium, Thursday and Friday, June 9 and 10.

We are very desirous that all citizens of the community attend the exhibition and we extend to all a hearty invitation to come and examine the handiwork of the students and witness the results attained during the past school year.

In manual training, furniture construction, bench woodwork, lathe work, mechanical and architectural drawing will be exhibited as well as work done in cement, carpentry and brick laying.

The art exhibit will include both drawing and craft work.

In the primary grades the children work from the imagination mainly; in the upper grades more work is done from present observation.

An illustrative work is original and all paper cutting is free-hand.

The subjects included in drawing are: flowers and foliage, landscapes, fruits and vegetables, interiors, still life, figures, birds and animals, and holidays.

The craft work includes basketry, weaving, clay modeling, stenciling and problems in paper and cardboard construction.

All grades and the high school will be represented.

The penmanship exhibit consists of development exercises, applied exercises, drills, sentences, poem, prose and page writing from grade one to eight inclusive.

Every pupil has prepared two specimens showing his attempt in mastering a rapid, easy and legible form of writing.

The Domestic Art Department will display cooking costumes made by the sixth grade girls; and gingham, organdy, wool and silk dresses, blouses, skirts, hats and undergarments made by the high school girls.
