BIG CELEBRATION

Mid-Summer Day Will Be Handsomely Observed By the Scandinavian People of the County

At a meeting held by the school board at Crystal Falls on June 7th, the use of the School Park and Athletic Park was granted to the Swedish people of Iron County for the celebration on June 24th.

A. Ostrand, A. L. Axelson, Arthur Broman and Carl Sholander went over to Bates Tuesday evening to meet with a committee from Iron River and Stambaugh at Capt. Swan Anderson's residence for the purpose of making preparations for the Mid Summer celebration. It was decided to have a ball game at the Athletic Park between Iron River, Stambaugh and Crystal Falls at 3:00 P. M. For that purpose ball teams are now busy practicing on both sides of the county, and there will also be tug of war between Iron River, Stambaugh and Crystal Falls. A double quartet from the west side will partake in the program.

Efforts are also being made to have a girl choir on the program and a men's quartet from Crystal Falls. The School Boys' Brass Band from Crystal Falls, with Mr. Frank Bertrand as leader, will furnish the music for the occasion.

Posters and bills advertising the program for the day in full will be distributed later. All the Swedish people of Iron County as well as outsiders are requested to partake in this celebration and be present in large numbers. The program will commence at 1 o'clock in the School Park at Crystal Falls. Lunch and refreshments will be served by committees in charge.

JUDSON CLOSES

Men From That Property Are Put On At the Balkan

The severest blow that Alpha experienced this dull season was the closing of the Judson mine. Orders to close came last Tuesday night and underground operations were suspended. The crew at the Judson were set to work at the Balkan mine, all men at that property going on a half-time basis.

One ray of hope that shot out through this cloud was the commencement of shipping at the Balkan. Orders to start shipping were issued Tuesday also and the empties were set in at the Balkan. The daily output from that property, the Amasa-Porter, the Fogarty and the Baltic will be sent direct to the docks. Just how long the operations will be confined to this small shipment is not known but it is hoped that something will happen to increase the shipments and put the property back on full time.

The Judson had been operated with a small crew since it was taken over by the Balkan people so that the actual number of men thrown out of employment is not great. It states an alternating at the Balkan that hits the men there also.

NOTICE TO CHAUFFEURS AND DRIVERS OF AUTOMOBILES IN IRON COUNTY

The law requiring chauffeurs and drivers of all vehicles equipped with and using electric lights upon the

public highways of this state, to effectually apply dimmers to forward lights so as to dim and lessen the same so as not to interfere with the vision of the drivers of any approaching vehicle, will be strictly enforced. Any person found violating this, as well as any other of the provisions of Chapter 89 of the Compiled Laws of the State of Michigan for the year 1915, as amended, will be arrested and prosecuted. Motor policemen have been stationed on the county roads and are instructed to strictly enforce the motor vehicle laws of the state.
