Accountant Gets \$12,000 Per Year Job in New York
New York (ANP) — Commissioner of Highways John T. Carroll has appointed Hannibal Herring as director of administration in the new Department of Highways. It was announced last week.

Herring, 41, was sworn in to the \$12,000 per year post by Commissioner Carroll.

Herring has been senior accountant group chief in the Department of Finance, the first Negro to be appointed a supervisor of tax auditors. He had 15 subordinates. In his new post, he will have about 200. It is believed he will be the first Negro director of administration in a major city department.

Herring was born in New Bern, N.C., graduating from an academic course at New Bern High School in 1940.

In the Army, he served in the Chemical Warfare Service from 1941 to 1943.

After his discharge, Herring came to Manhattan and worked first in Port Newark in a private shipyard. He moved to the Navy Yard in Brooklyn as a first-class welder and then matriculated at New York University's School of Commerce, Accounts and Finance where he received his B.S. degree in 1948.

Herring is chairman of the board of directors of the Aegis Society, a group of Negro civil servants in the Departments of Finance, Law, Public Works and Board of Estimate. He is also a delegate to and organizer for the 45,000-member metropolitan Federation of Negro Civil Service Organizations.

Knifed To Death In Argument Over Who Was Best Cook
Houston (ANP) — Mrs. Lucille Wright, alias Lucille White, 32, was knifed to death last week following an argument with a drinking friend over who could cook better.

Allen White, Jr., 28, was arrested and charged with murder in court. White told police they had been drinking and were cooking. He said both of them made statements about who could cook the best. "While I was peeling an onion, she ran over to get the onion and ran into the knife," he said.

Lola Mae Chatman, a witness, said the two were arguing and that Mrs. Wright shoved White. She said White got his knife out and she heard Mrs. Wright scream "Oh, Allen." She said she did not see the actual cutting.

Mrs. Wright died of a stab wound at the scene of the incident. Police recovered a knife with a 4-inch blade.

Bluefield Hotel Bars Negroes, W. Va. Legionnaires Ponder Next Move
Charleston, W. Va. (ANP) — A civil rights controversy boiled up last week over the State American Legion convention scheduled in Bluefield, July 28-29, after the convention headquarters hotel refused accommodations to Negro Legionnaires.

H. S. Burnett, manager of the West Virginian Hotel at Bluefield, said that despite a protest from a Legion post and the West Virginia Human Rights Commission, "we don't intend to change our policy no matter what happens."

The flare-up came a few days after Legion headquarters in Indianapolis threatened to cancel a Sept. 6-12 national convention set for New Orleans because of possible discrimination against Negro delegates in hotels and restaurant.

Nathaniel Parker, 25, 771 Marshall was arrested on April 28, after St. Paul police officers observed him fail to make a signal after several turns in the Dale-Rondo area. A further investigation by officers revealed that Parker's driving license was suspended and he was arrested.

Chicago (ANP) — The Stork visited the Dick Gregorys for the third time last week, as the famous comedian's wife, Lillian, gave birth to a seven-pound boy in Chicago Lying-In Hospital.

Gregory, who gained national prominence for his satire of racial topics, was, like any other dutiful father, was at the hospital when his son was born.

The infant, named Richard Claxton Gregory, Jr., is the couples third child. He joins sisters Michelle, age 3½, and Lynn, 1½.

African Christians And Muhammadans Co-operate In Decolonizing Africa

The whole of Africa is not yet free from white men's colonial exploitation. There is still the Republic of South Africa ruled by a cruel white minority. Furthermore, there are the Portuguese colonies of Angola and Mozambique which might take one or two years before they are freed. The rest, including Kenya, with a population 7,287,000, and about ten other small and tiny colonies will soon join the 32 Black free and independent states. One of the major secrets in the African political successes in recent years is the close co-

operation between Muhammadans and Christians in Africa.

Muhammadans outnumber Christians in most African states by three to one. In education, Moslems do not have as many educated members among themselves as Christians do. In my opinion, however, the Moslems are more politically conscious than the Christians. This is due, among other things, to the Islamic political broadcast from Radio Cairo in Egypt, North Africa.

Although Christian Churches did not encourage their members to participate in politics until we were awakened by Kenya's war of independence in 1952, some of the educated Christians got into politics. Without difficult, these leaders received unflinching support from Moslems and politically conscious Christians. In some cases, Christian political leaders did not hesitate to forget their Churches' connections if their Churches remained supporters of the colonial divide and rule as well as explo-

sive policies. In states like Egypt where political leaders are Muhammadans, slogans such as, "we are all Egyptians" and "let us unite to build our nation," were enough to rally Christians and Muhammadans behind Nasser.

Tanganyika, among others, was not an exception. Bibi Titi Bint Muhammad, a prominent Moslem woman politician, called upon all Tanganyikans to rally behind her and Nyerere, a Christian political leader, in order to free Tanganyika and Africa. All Tanganyikans responded favorably. As a result, within less than ten years Tanganyika became independent and dedicated supporter of Ghana and other African states in the struggle for African freedom.

An elderly Moslem woman member in my Christian youth movement executive committee before I came over to America called upon the youth to unite and work for the elimination of bear bars in their country congregation. They responded and succeeded. In other words, almost wherever Moslems and Christians have, as daughters and sons of Africa, worked together, success has been quick and remarkable.

When Bishop Makarias was on his way from exile in Seychelles to Cyprus in 1958, he stopped at Nairobi, East Africa. There he saw many tribes and many Christian denominations. Then, advising the then Nairobi District African Congress, he said, "Your progress and survival depends upon your unity as black people, no matter what your tribal or religious affiliations are." Judging from the events in Africa, many people have successfully followed Bishop Makarias' advice. As long as this advice, among others, is followed by black people everywhere, our bright future will quickly be attained and retained. In Unity is Strength.

American Negro Leaders Tighten Link With Black African Nations

Chicago (ANP)—Evidence was given at a recent meeting in New York that key American Negro leaders not only intend to continue their efforts toward establishing an active link with the peoples of Black Africa but also plan to expand such efforts.

Earlier proposals for setting up such a link reached a high on April 3, when a decision was made to establish a permanent liaison between United States Negro leadership and the

at the White House last Dec. 17, during which the Chief Executive told the leaders that he felt the 20 million Negroes in this country had a responsibility for the role of the U.S. in Africa and that he valued the concern they felt for the African peoples. Last Jan. 29, the same leaders conferred for two hours with Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson, head of the U.S. mission to the United Nations. Later, the Conference criticized a U.S. Department of Agriculture proposal to buy 52,000 tons of sugar from South Africa in connection with the withdrawal of sugar purchases from Cuba. The leaders took vigorous exception to many positions regarding racist-dominated South Africa taken by the U.S. delegation in the General Assembly and committees of the UN.

A highlight of the April meeting was the Negro leaders' criticism of Gen. Lucius D. Clay's report on foreign aid and the Administration's proposed cut in the aid program. They said that the proposed cut would be detrimental to the African states for which \$300,000,000 had been earmarked for

the 1963-64 fiscal year before the reduction was announced. Wilkins attacked what he described as an insignificant amount set aside originally for aid to African nations considering their population and their needs. He posed the question: "Is there a color line in our foreign aid program?"

Whitney Young of the National Urban League said that the committee had been shocked by the attitude on aid to Africa expressed in the Clay report, adding that the amounts allocated to Africa were minimal compared with the \$12,000,000,000 distributed through the Marshall Plan in four years. The Clay report recommended withdrawal of U.S. aid to Africa, proposing that the burden be carried by former colonial powers.

While the committee had earlier decided to continue in existence as a nucleus for a permanent body, the forming of the liaison is viewed as a new and significant step.

S. O. Adefo, permanent representative of Nigeria at the United Nations, took part in the session of the American Negro leaders. He was mandated by his African colleagues at the UN to represent them.

Roy Wilkins, who recently told a West Berlin conference of the U.S. Negro's plans to "offer counsel to emerging and developing peoples," said the decision to establish a permanent liaison with the African states had grown out of the Arden House conference. The purpose of this liaison effort, the NAACP leader explained, was to discuss problems of mutual interest and to support each group's aspirations.

Informed sources said the meeting was devoted in part to a discussion of the organizational forms and the financing of a future permanent organization to heighten the American Negro's interest in Africa.

The committee received a sympathetic hearing from President Kennedy in an hour-long discussion
