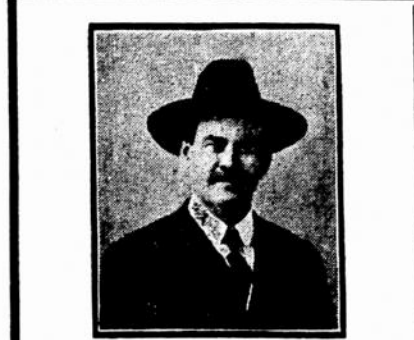

DECISION IN PETERSON CASE

Judge Qvale Finds for J. G. Lundquist of Meeker County for About \$27,000.

The noted suit of J. G. Lundquist vs. J. W. and Frank T. Peterson for an accounting of a partnership that existed between them from 1888 to 1897, which was tried before Judge Powers in 1913, but which on account of the illness and later the death of Judge Powers, was by stipulation turned over to Judge Qvale for a decision, was decided by the latter Monday, when his decision and the voluminous record of the case was received by express from Willmar by Clerk of Court Atkinson.

The findings of the Judge cover 19 pages of typewritten manuscript, and are signed also by Judge Daly of Renville.

The decision will no doubt be appealed from the supreme court by the Petersons. It gives Lundquist the sum of \$14,270, the amount he put into the partnership at the time it was formed, and interest at the legal rate from January first, 1913, to this date, less certain amounts received by him from the Petersons, aggregating nearly \$6,000.

ROSEVILLE PIONEER GOES WEST. R. C. Benton Leaves For California Where He Expects to Make His Home.

R. C. Benton, the well known old time pioneer of Roseville, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Susan Benton, departed last Monday for San Jose, California, to make his future home, at which place his son, George and daughter, Mrs. Rhoda Sitton reside.

Mr. Benton came to this state in 1863 and to Kandiyohi county in 1865. Continuously for about one-half century Mr. Benton has lived on the Roseville prairie, not having, we are told, even made a trip to Minneapolis in 37 years. Last year he sold his farm to his son, Solon L. Benton, the real estate man of this city, and will go to the West. His many friends will wish him good luck.
