only way he could escape death in the trenches.
In August, Gentry broke a finger when cranking his truck and thereafter was forced to use his left hand. Then he suffered a second injury when cranking the truck and had to be taken to the American Red Cross Hospital at Paris. He was the only American in the hospital, he said, and received

special attentions from doctors and nurses. He cabled his parents announcing that he would soon undergo an operation and later when he was discharged from the hospital, but the second message went astray.

Tried For Aviation Corps.
After his discharge he tried to enlist in the American aviation section in France, but when the doctors saw the bandages they sent him away.
"There was nothing left for me to do but go home," he said last night, "but I want to go back."
When in Havre waiting for a trans-

port to take him across the English Channel, he heard his first ragtime since arriving in France. It was played by an American Army band. The band was marching through a street and he followed it. When the British officer saw him marching with the band all saluted him, thinking he was a high officer. In Southampton a packet of letters he was carrying to the United States for a nurse he met in the French hospital, were taken from, but he was successful in smuggling through the photographs he had taken at the front.

He sailed from Liverpool September 8, on the Philadelphia. Two days out a submarine appeared and passengers were warned to get their life belts. The ship made a sharp turn, escaping the submarine's torpedo by a few feet. The gunners on the boat then opened fire on the periscope and the submarine disappeared. On the Philadelphia was a negro who had made three preceding attempts to get back to America, each time sailing on a ship sunk by a submarine. When this negro saw the Statue of Liberty he fell on his knees and gave thanks for his safe return.
