

**PLAN FOR Y. M. C. A. CAMPAIGN**

**Workers in War Fund Move Meet—Missouri to Raise Million.**  
At the meeting held at the Y. M. C. A. Friday night, plans were presented for organizing the University and Boone County to aid in raising the \$25,000,000 which the Y. M. C. A. of the United States will raise for war work. A committee was appointed to select a delegation to attend the meeting at Jefferson City next Sunday. This meeting will be held at 2:30 o'clock in the courthouse. Another committee, with Dean Eldon R. James as chairman, was appointed to take charge of the University work. Judge David H. Harris is chairman of the eighth district which comprises eight counties including Boone County. Hugh Stephens of Jefferson City is campaign manager. C. C. Hatfield, international county work secretary who has his headquarters at Chicago, is here to assist in this work. Missouri will furnish \$1,000,000 of the fund. An attempt will be made to raise \$50,000 from the colleges of Missouri. Twenty per cent of this will be given to the Y. W. C. A.
