Missouri Will Play Ames, Drake and Oklahoma Elevens in Columbia Next Fall.

TRACK MEET TO W. U. Baseball and Track Schedules Also Formed by Officials at Kansas City Meeting.

By United Press. KANSAS CITY, Dec. 4.—The University of Nebraska has been re-admitted to membership in the Missouri Valley Conference by the delegates to the twelfth annual meeting of the Conference here.

The schedules for the season of 1921 in all the sports have been practically completed. Nebraska comes back into the conference playing Oklahoma, Kansas, Ames and Drake in football next year.

Washington University was awarded the annual Missouri Valley Field Meet which is to be held on May 27 and 28. The annual Missouri-Kansas Indoor Track Meet will be held at Convention Hall in Kansas City March 20.

M. U. IS NAMED IN \$7,500 SUIT Arthur S. Zumwalt Charges Negligence in Accident—8 Other Cases.

Nine suits were filed with the circuit clerk today, this being the last day in which suits other than criminal cases can be filed for trial at the next term of court.

A suit for \$7,500 against the University was filed by Arthur S. Zumwalt. Zumwalt charges that while he was working on a jointer owned by the University, his hand was caught in the knives of the machine with a resultant loss of three fingers and the tip of a fourth.

Frank B. Wegs is suing E. E. Leonard and J. E. Lyon, asking a lien on property built for Lyon by Leonard. Leonard failed to pay Wegs for a heating plant used in the building.

Two suits were filed against the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway by H. E. Graves and R. M. Neeley. Each charges that the railway failed to furnish charges for stock shipments.

A petition was filed for the dissolution of the University Missouriian Association in order that a new corporation to publish the Missouriian might be formed.

The Scharf Kaken Manufacturing Company filed suit against the Centralia Manufacturing Company, asking the payment of \$971.92 due on an account. The Centralia Manufacturing Company denies incurring the debt.

R. Cook petitioned to adopt Bertha Maudox, the 31-year-old daughter of Cook's wife, Phoebe Cook.

CHESTER SILENT TO MOTHER Refuses to Talk When She Visits Him in Cell.

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MRS. M'SWINEY RECEIVES SINN FEIN WELCOME

Sympathizers With Sinn Fein Flags and Badges Extend "Silent" Reception to Martyr's Wife.

NO TROUBLE OCCURS Police Keep Close Vigilance for Outbreak—Mrs. McSwiney to Testify About Ireland.

New York, Dec. 4.—Received in silence by Sinn Fein sympathizers wearing Sinn Fein badges and carrying the Sinn Fein flag, Mrs. Muriel McSwiney landed today from the White Star liner, Celtic, on which she had come from England.

As soon as they came ashore they were taken immediately to the Hotel St. Regis. Mrs. McSwiney came here to testify before the New York Nation Magazine Commission which is investigating the state of affairs in Ireland.

Trouble had been expected when Mrs. McSwiney landed and several hundred police had been stationed about the car in which she was to ride and along the dock to keep the crowd back when she came ashore.

The present lease on the Hall Theater will expire January 15 and the theater will again be under the management of Tom Hall, the owner of the house.

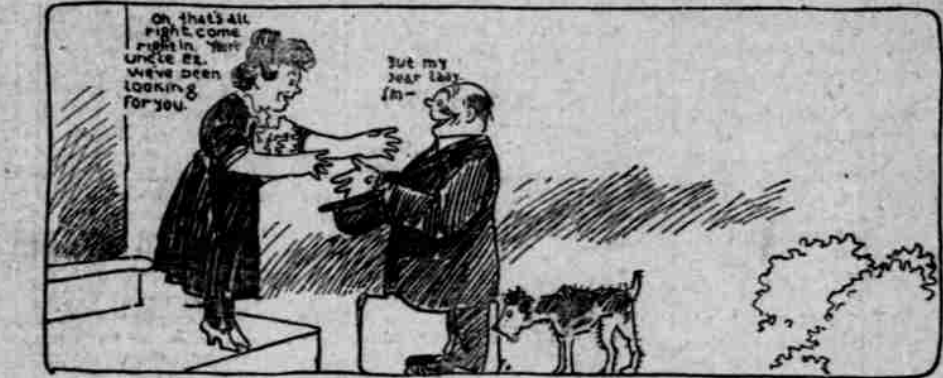

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CONSPIRACY TO ROB FARMERS SAYS SENATOR

Capper of Kansas Declares Gambling Is Main Factor in Decline of Grain Prices.

WOULD TAX FUTURES Says There Is Immense Plot to Milk Grower of Millions of Dollars on Crops.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Gambling in grain of all kinds was today declared to be the main factor which has caused the great declines in the prices of grain.

Senator Capper of Kansas today said that there is an immense conspiracy made up to carry on gambling in grain which is intended to milk the farmers and grain growers out of millions of dollars.

He said, "This bill will stop the tremendous amount of gambling which is going on in grains and will eliminate the wheat pits and the great warehouses in every city where the gambling is carried on."

WILL OUTLINE FARM POLICY Agricultural Leaders of Country to Meet in Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 4.—Agricultural leaders from every part of the country will assemble here Monday in the second annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation, to take up the problems confronting the farmer and to discuss measures for their solution and relief in conjunction with the formation of a national agricultural policy.

ARGENTINE TO LEAVE LEAGUE? Motion That All Independent Nations Declare Stand May Admit Germany.

GENEVA, Dec. 4.—Argentina's delegate, today declared that Argentina had postponed her action of breaking away from the League. Pueyrredon also stated that he saw no reason for Argentina's dropping out of the League.
