NEGRESS ADMITS KILLING JACOB ECK.

Confesses to Acting Chief Keely That She Fired Shot Which Caused His Death.

HAS PLEA OF SELF-DEFENSE.

Declares She Shot Sergeant When He Attacked Her With an Iron Poker After a Dispute.

Mattie Fullerton, one of the negroes arrested in connection with the death of Sergeant Jacob E. Eck of the United States marines, yesterday confessed that she fired the shot which killed him.

The shooting, she says, was in self-defense, and followed an attack which she alleges he made on her with an iron poker. The bullet entered the back and struck diagonally through the body.

Mattie Fullerton and Leona Woods first told the police that Jacob Eck was in the house at No. 317 South Third street, and killed Eck. The former, after a severe examination by Acting Chief of Detectives Keely yesterday, admitted that she fired the shot.

The negroes declare that the trouble started when Eck began to abuse negroes. Eck, she says, slapped Lulu Jones, in attempting to save the latter. Mattie Fullerton says she tried to hold Eck's arm. He seized a poker and struck her.

Eck's body is still at the morgue. The military authorities having given no directions concerning the disposition of the body. Eck's mother in Albany, N. Y., has been notified of his death.

As second officer in charge of the recruiting corps in St. Louis, Eck had spent two months in the city, and had been before his death he was engaged in writing an article recounting his experiences in Panama.

Joseph Hick, of No. 319 Allen avenue at 10 o'clock yesterday morning requested Police Officer Hendy to arrest Charles Gemel, 65 years old, who lives in the rear of No. 182 South Eighth street.

Hick attempted to jump in and down himself. Hendy, who was standing by, jumped in and held Gemel until the officers arrived.
