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VENERABLE JUDGE C. F. SHULTZ VICTIM OF 'INDIANS' AT PRIMARIES.

Gray Hairs of Democrat, Who Has Voted in St. Louis for 45 Years, Not Respected by Ruffians at the Polls.

One of the victims of the "Indians" who operated Saturday at the Twenty-eighth ward was Judge Chauncey F. Shultz of No. 592 McPherson avenue, who has lived in St. Louis for 45 years.

Judge Shultz was presiding justice of the County Court in 1874, and was one of the Forest Park Commissioners. When Forest Park was opened June 6, 1879, Judge Shultz made the inaugural address.

He was appointed Assistant Treasurer of the United States during Cleveland's first administration, and was in charge of the subtreasury in St. Louis. Judge Shultz is 59 years old, and his hair and beard are all white.

Speaking of the treatment he received at the polls last Saturday, he said: "I have voted in St. Louis for forty-five years, and as I have always been an unwavering supporter of the Democratic party, my treatment at the Arcade last Saturday was such that my indignation can find no words to express the disgust and humiliation I feel at the thought that such an outrage on common decency was done in the name of the party to which I have devoted a lifetime of loyalty."
