

REPUBLICAN TICKET WITHOUT AN EQUAL MAJORITY IN ELECTORAL COLLEGE TO BE LARGEST IN PARTY'S HISTORY.

RESULTS SURPRISE EVERYONE

DEMOCRATS CARRY ONLY THE SOUTH AND FAIL TO HOLD ALL THE STATES GIVEN TO BRYAN IN 1900.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. New York, Nov. 8.—The Republican national ticket has been elected by a vote in the Electoral College that will exceed that of 292 given to McKinley in 1900. The result of to-day's balloting was astounding even to the most sanguine of the Republican managers. Confident as they were of success, they were not prepared for the astonishing figures which followed the closing of the polls, bringing into the Republican column not only all of those States they had claimed as safe for their candidates, but with the possible exception of Maryland, every State classed as doubtful.

Democratic successes are confined to the solid South, in which Kentucky is included, and Mr. Taft has not carried a single State which did not give its vote to Mr. Bryan four years ago. Unofficial returns indicate that he has lost some of those which the Nebraska candidate held for his party. Official figures from some of the Northwestern States may slightly change the totals.

ROOSEVELT'S STATEMENT. As a dramatic climax to the sensational majorities given him, came President Roosevelt's formal announcement that he would not be a candidate for re-election, furnishing the only exciting aspect to an election night otherwise so uneventful that it was better to attend a conference in New York than to witness the proceedings.

Late in the afternoon an announcement from Melvin G. Palliser, manager of the campaign for Thomas E. Watson, the candidate of the People's party, that as a result of the overwhelming Democratic defeat steps would be taken to form a new party. To this announcement followed an announcement that Mr. Bryan, Mr. Watson and William Randolph Hearst will be invited to attend a conference in New York about a week's time.

The period of suspense following the closing of the polls, and the fact that no election in recent years has the result been definitely known so soon. Hardly had the sun gone down when the results in New York began to appear. Bulletin followed bulletin, each showing large Republican gains, and by 10 o'clock it was evident that the great Empire State had given the Republican candidates a majority beyond the predictions of the party managers.

MAKE CONCESSIONS. So convincing was the story of the bulletins that at 7:30 August Belmont at Democratic headquarters conceded Roosevelt's election by an overwhelming majority, and at a quarter past eight the Democratic leaders who had managed to keep their party admitted that the Republicans had carried the Southern States. There was no disposition to hope for a contest.

As State after State sent in its Republican majority, the Democrats told the reporters that they were conceding defeat and offered no explanation. Soon after Mr. Belmont's admission Judge Parker acknowledged the situation by telegraphing President Roosevelt his congratulations. The perfect weather conditions which prevailed over practically the entire country brought out a large number of politicians who were to be seen in the streets and in this increase of balloting the Republicans gained more than their share.

PENNSYLVANIA HEADS LIST. Pennsylvania heads the list as the banner Republican State, with the plurality of 25,000; New York comes next with 18,000. Nevada, which was carried by Bryan four years ago, is Republican, and the indications are that possibly West Virginia, Colorado, also Democratic in 1900, have gone back to the Republican column. Delaware is estimated at about 30,000 Republican, Massachusetts about 30,000 and Connecticut, in which the more sanguine of the Democrats had claimed a majority, had hopes, in about 25,000 for Roosevelt.

While on the national ticket the Democrats have not conceded a crushing defeat, they have retrieved themselves on some State tickets. They have reversed the national vote by electing Bryan in Massachusetts, Minnesota and probably in Colorado. While complete returns are lacking at this hour (1:30 o'clock), it seems probable that the Democrats have elected Governor in Nebraska and possibly West Virginia. In the latter State the vote is very close.

Montana also elects a Democratic Governor. FOLK RUNS AHEAD IN ST. LOUIS COUNTY. Showing a Great Surprise to Leaders of Both Parties, the Ticket Has Big Lead. Fourteen out of thirty-five precincts in St. Louis County, including Maplewood, the largest precinct in the county, and Webster Groves, gave Folk 1,233 and Wallace 2,365.

For Congress Barthold received 2,677 and Tichacek 959. The latter figures were the regular ticket figures, Folk running far ahead of his ticket in these precincts heard from. It is not thought that the returns from the other precincts of the county will affect the returns. Folk's showing was a great surprise to the leaders of both parties in this city.

MURPHY DOES NOT ATTEMPT TO EXPLAIN. New York, Nov. 8.—Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, made the following statement: "Of course I am very much surprised at the result. I do not attempt to account for it. Whatever may have been the cause, it will develop and the party can deal with it."

"I sincerely regret the defeat of Judge Parker. He was in all respects a worthy candidate. As much can be said for Judge Herrick and his associates on the State ticket. They undoubtedly were the choice of the Democracy, and their defeat is to be regretted more for the sake of the country and the party than for the candidates individually."

BLISS DECLARES THE RESULT IS MAGNIFICENT. New York, Nov. 8.—Cornelius N. Bliss, the treasurer of the Republican Committee, said: "The result is magnificent. In this State especially the people proved, as they always will in an emergency, that they love justice and a square deal and that they condemn the slanders that have been directed against the President. Chairman Corwin, Governor elect Higgins and Governor O'Connell."

DEMOCRATS IN MASSACHUSETTS

W. L. Douglas Elected Governor by Twenty Thousand Plurality.

ROOSEVELT CARRIES STATE.

Successful Gubernatorial Candidate Expresses His Thanks to the Voters in Statement.

Boston, Nov. 8.—Sufficient returns from to-day's election have been received up to 10 o'clock to-night to indicate the election of William L. Douglas (Dem.) for Governor by almost 20,000 plurality.

Returns from 200 cities and towns and all but three precincts of Boston give Douglas (Dem.), 201,273; Estes (Rep.), 75,782. Indications are that Roosevelt has carried Massachusetts by 80,000.

DOUGLAS ISSUES STATEMENT. Brookline, Mass., Nov. 8.—W. L. Douglas at 9 o'clock to-night issued a statement in which he said: "That I am profoundly gratified at the result of the balloting does not fully express my feelings. To be honored with the election as Governor of Massachusetts on the Democratic ticket in the presidential year is surely an earnest of the good will of my fellow citizens of all parties. I am all too much pleased with the vote in my own city."

LOUISIANA. MAJORITY FOR PARKER 35,000. Seven Democratic Congressmen Elected in Louisiana.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 8.—The Democratic have carried Louisiana for Parker and Davis by a majority of probably 35,000. Seven Democratic Congressmen have been elected. The election was peaceable, and outside of New Orleans a light vote was cast.

WYOMING. REPUBLICAN MAJORITY 7,000. Governor and Congressman Elected.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 8.—Partial returns indicate that Roosevelt carried Wyoming by 7,000 majority, and the election of Mandel (Rep.) to Congress and Brooks (Rep.) for Governor.

TEXAS. PARKER GETS 250,000 VOTES. Roosevelt Receives 60,000, and All Democratic Congressmen Elected.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 8.—Early returns show that the vote cast to-day will hardly exceed 250,000, of which 200,000 were cast for Parker, 40,000 for Roosevelt and the balance scattering.

SOUTH DAKOTA. MAJORITY IS CONCEDED. Democratic Chairman Makes a Statement.

Waterbury, S. D., Nov. 8.—Chairman Martin of the Democratic State Committee issued a statement in which he concedes that Roosevelt has polled 60,000 votes in the State, Parker 30,000, and Watson 15,000.

MONTANA. ROOSEVELT WINS BY ABOUT 5,000. Count is Proceeding Slowly and Plurality is Merely Estimated.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 8.—The count is proceeding slowly throughout the State. The reports already received indicate that the State is safe for Roosevelt by about 5,000. Silver Bow County is yet to be heard from.

NORTH CAROLINA. DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY OF 50,000. North Carolina Probably Returns All Ten Congressmen.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 8.—There is hardly any doubt but that all ten Democratic Congressmen have been elected. Only the two mountain districts are in doubt—the Eighth and the Tenth. These the Republicans do not concede, and it will take a day to know absolutely.

MISSISSIPPI. DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY OF 50,000. Opposition Polls Between 10,000 and 11,000—Congressmen Returned.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 8.—Returns come in showing that between 60,000 and 70,000 votes were cast.

TENNESSEE. PLURALITY OF 25,000 FOR PARKER. Frazier Is Elected Governor and Eight Democratic Congressmen.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 8.—Early returns indicate that Parker has carried the State by a plurality of 25,000. The vote has been high.

MAINE. PLURALITY MAY REACH 37,000. Three Hundred and Fifty Cities Give Roosevelt 33,000 Votes Lead.

Portland, Me., Nov. 8.—Three hundred and fifty cities and towns for President in Maine, out of 519, give Parker 24,730 and Roosevelt 57,496. On this basis the Republican plurality in Maine is estimated at 57,000.

CONNECTICUT. CLAIMS THE STATE BY 25,000. Republican State Chairman Declares State Ticket is Also Elected.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 8.—Michael Kennedy, chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, at 9 o'clock made the statement to the Associated Press that Roosevelt will carry the State by 25,000.

NEBRASKA. DEMOCRATS MAY CARRY STATE. George W. Borge, Fusion Candidate for Governor, Ahead of Parker.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 8.—Returns come in slowly from both city and State. Precincts in Omaha reporting thus far indicate a Republican gain on the national ticket and a corresponding loss on the State ticket.

COLORADO. BOTH SIDES CLAIMING THE STATE. Democratic Chairman Says Parker and Adams Will Win by 12,000.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 8.—Milton Smith, chairman of the Democratic State Committee, says Adams (Dem.) for Governor, will surely have a 6,000 majority over Peck, though the latter is believed to be holding his own with the vote of 192, when he carried the district by 1,500.

KENTUCKY. DEMOCRATIC PLURALITY DOUBLED. Factional Fight in Strongly Republican Eleventh District Causes Increase.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 8.—With one-third of Kentucky's 1,286 precincts reported at 10 o'clock to-night, the vote indicates a majority in the State for Parker from 12,000 to 14,000.

ARIZONA. PARKER'S PLURALITY 40,000. All Democratic Congressmen Elected.

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 8.—The Gazette's advice from all parts of the State bear out the estimates of a plurality of 40,000 for Parker.

VIRGINIA. DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY OF 25,000. Nine Congressmen Out of Ten Elected.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—The election in Virginia to-day was absolutely without disturbance, so far as has been heard.

GEORGIA. DEMOCRATIC PLURALITY 45,000. Georgia Polls 90,000 Votes—All Democratic Congressmen Returned.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 8.—The total vote in Georgia will count up a little more than 90,000, which is very high.

UTAH. DEMOCRATS CONCEDE STATE. Roosevelt's Plurality in the State is Estimated at 8,000.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Nov. 8.—The heaviest vote ever polled is reported with much scratching. At Democratic State headquarters it is estimated that Roosevelt has carried the State by 8,000 plurality.

IOWA. PLURALITY ABOUT 125,000. Wade, the Democratic Congressman, Holding His Own.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 8.—Returns are slow in coming in, but indications on well-distributed returns indicate that Roosevelt's plurality will be 125,000, and the entire State ticket will have about the same number.

INDIANA. LANDSLIDE APPARENT IN INDIANA. Roosevelt's Plurality Estimated at 45,000 to 55,000, Double McKinley's.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 8.—Indiana has been carried by the Republicans by from 45,000 to 55,000. The Legislature will be Republican by nearly fifty, probably more.

OHIO. MAY EXCEED HIGH-WATER MARK. No Accurate Figures Attainable at a Late Hour.

Columbus, O., Nov. 8.—The estimate to-night was that the Republican plurality in Ohio would exceed the high-water mark of 157,000 in 1894, and also any previous Republican record on Congressmen.

NEW JERSEY. REPUBLICANS SWEEP THE STATE. Roosevelt's Plurality Will Exceed That of McKinley in 1900.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 8.—Returns from all parts of New Jersey indicate that President Roosevelt has carried the State by a much larger majority than that of McKinley in 1900, which was 56,890, over Bryan.

WISCONSIN. LAFOLLETTE'S ELECTION IN DOUBT. State is Conceded to Roosevelt and Republican Governor is Probable.

Milwaukee, Nov. 8.—At 10 o'clock to-night only scattering returns were received from the election in Wisconsin. The State is conceded to Roosevelt by a large plurality.

KANSAS. MUCH SCRATCHING OF STATE TICKET—KELLY, FOR TREASURER, RUNS BEHIND.

Topeka, Kas., Nov. 8.—The indications are that Roosevelt will carry the State by a plurality of 50,000 in the State and LaFollette (Rep.) a safe plurality of 20,000.

RHODE ISLAND. RETURNS, HOWEVER, INDICATE ROOSEVELT'S SUCCESS.

CALIFORNIA. ROOSEVELT MAKES A GAIN. Majority is Larger Than That Given to McKinley.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 8.—Scattering returns from California at 8 p. m. indicate that Roosevelt has carried the State by a larger majority than did McKinley four years ago.

MICHIGAN. REPUBLICANS MAKE GREAT CLAIM. Say Roosevelt's Majority Will Be 125,000, at Least.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 8.—The Republican State Central Committee announces that the returns they have received from the State indicate that Roosevelt will have a majority of from 125,000 to 130,000.

FLORIDA. USUAL DEMOCRATIC MAJORITIES. Returns Are Scattered, but Assure Election of All Congressmen.

Jacksonville, Fla., Nov. 8.—The few scattered returns so far received indicate the usual Democratic majorities in Florida. The Democratic candidates for Congress are all elected.

OREGON. MAJORITY MAY BE DOUBLED. President's Advantage Predicted to Be 20,000.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 8.—The Oregonian says this county will give Roosevelt between 12,000 and 15,000, and the State will go Republican by 30,000, almost twice the majority given any President heretofore.

INDIANA. LANDSLIDE APPARENT IN INDIANA. Roosevelt's Plurality Estimated at 45,000 to 55,000, Double McKinley's.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 8.—Indiana has been carried by the Republicans by from 45,000 to 55,000. The Legislature will be Republican by nearly fifty, probably more.

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MARYLAND. BOTH SIDES CLAIM MARYLAND. Incomplete Returns From Baltimore Indicate Parker Has Carried City.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 8.—Returns from the city and State are not complete, but it is apparent from the official reports so far received that the vote in Maryland is very close, and that the actual result may not be definitely known to-night, owing to the slowness of returns from remote districts in eastern shore and southern counties.

WEST VIRGINIA. WEST VIRGINIA STILL IN DOUBT. Returns Extremely Meager; Heavy Democratic Gain Are Shown.

Parkersburg, W. Va., Nov. 8.—Without a precinct in the State counted, enough has been learned to indicate that the Democratic ticket has made very heavy gains.

NEVADA. REPUBLICAN TICKET IN THE LEAD. State Practically Conceded to Have Gone for Roosevelt.

Reno, Nev., Nov. 8.—So far as heard from the Republican State ticket is in the lead, and Ferguson (Rep.) for Governor is probably elected over Vanuuser (Dem.). The State is conceded to Roosevelt.

Vote on National, State and County Offices Given by Congressional Districts.

SIXTEENTH.

(In 1902 Republican plurality for Grant in Sixteenth District was 3,757.)

BUREAU. Princeton, Ill., Nov. 8.—Roosevelt carries Bureau County by a plurality of 2,300, as compared with 1,500 for McKinley four years ago. Deneen for Governor will have a plurality of 4,150.

PEORIA. Peoria, Ill., Nov. 8.—Vote in Peoria County gives Roosevelt a majority of 2,900, a gain as compared with the vote in 1900 of 2,000. The legislative ticket is in doubt. Deneen for Governor has a majority of 464 over McKinley as compared with vote in 1900 of 200.

FORD. Paxton, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in Ford County gives Roosevelt a plurality of 1,823 over Parker in fourteen precincts of the fifteen in the county, a Republican gain of 464 over McKinley in 1900. The prospects are that there is a uniformity in the vote on the entire ticket.

MCLEAN. Bloomington, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in McLean County gives Roosevelt 8,100, Parker 4,500. For Governor: Deneen 8,250, Stricker 4,200.

MACON. Decatur, Ill., Nov. 8.—Macon County, with ten precincts to hear from, gives Roosevelt a plurality of 2,900, a Republican gain over 1900. The rest of the Republican ticket will have practically the same vote. Democrats did not vote. Ugleby and Robinson (Reps.), and O. D. Gray (Dem.), are elected to the Legislature from the Twenty-eighth District. McKinley will carry the Nineteenth District for Congress by 5,000 plurality, a Republican gain of 3,000 over 1902.

SHELBY. Shelbyville, Ill., Nov. 8.—Returns in Shelby county indicate that Parker carries the county by 500 plurality. For Stricker, the plurality in the county is 200. For Congressman, Sumner, 500 plurality.

FORD. Paxton, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in Ford County gives Roosevelt a plurality of 1,925 over Parker. The vote on the entire ticket is evidently in the same proportion.

LOGAN. Lincoln, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in Logan County indicates a majority for Roosevelt of 400, against a Democratic majority of 200 in 1900. Stricker for Governor runs ahead of his ticket in home city.

LIVINGSTON. Pontiac, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in Livingston County gives Roosevelt a plurality of 2,000, over McKinley 1,200. Deneen 2,225, a Republican gain over 1900. Deneen ran a little behind on the head of the ticket. For Congress, he is elected to the Senate and Kerrick (Rep.) Ireland (Rep.) and Moran (Dem.) to the Legislature.

MCLEAN. Bloomington, Ill., Nov. 8.—For President fifty-eight precincts in McLean County give Roosevelt 8,800; Parker, 5,600, a Republican gain of 3,200. For Governor, McLean County gives Deneen 8,875; Stricker, 4,200. For Congress, George W. Stubblied is re-elected over Dunning (Dem.) by 4,500. Coyle and Phillips (Reps.) and Innan (Dem.) are elected to the lower House from the Twenty-sixth District.

WOODFORD. Eureka, Ill., Nov. 8.—Twelve precincts in Woodford County give Parker 1,847; Roosevelt 1,832. The same precincts in 1900 gave McKinley 1,233 and Roosevelt 958. Deneen and Stricker run with their tickets.

LOGAN. Lincoln, Ill., Nov. 8.—Returns from fifteen precincts out of twenty-one at 12 o'clock indicate that Roosevelt has carried Logan County by 300 majority. Deneen (Rep.) for Governor, 300. This is a Democratic loss of 400, as the county went for Bryan in 1900. Stricker (Dem.), candidate for Governor, ran ahead of the ticket in this home county. All Republican legislative and county officers were elected by good majorities.

CLARK. Martinsville, Ill., Nov. 8.—Martinsville Township, Clark County, gives Roosevelt 45 majority, a Republican gain of 68 over 1900.

EDGAR. Paris, Ill., Nov. 8.—Partial returns from Edgar County indicate that Roosevelt and the State ticket will have a majority of 200 or more in the county. Bryan had a majority of 11 in 1900.

CUMBERLAND. Toledo, Ill., Nov. 8.—Estimated result in Cumberland County gives Roosevelt a majority. Deneen, for Governor, running slightly ahead. The Democrats elect a Senator and two Representatives in this (the Fourth) district, and the county ticket is very close. The probability is that Mumford, the Democratic candidate for Circuit Clerk will be elected by a small margin.

WARREN. (In 1902 Republican plurality for Warner in Nineteenth District was 4,200.)

COLES. Mattoon, Ill., Nov. 8.—Incomplete returns in Coles County indicate that Roosevelt and Deneen carried the county by increased majorities. The Democrats elect a Senator and two Representatives in this (the Fourth) district, and the county ticket is very close. The probability is that Mumford, the Democratic candidate for Circuit Clerk will be elected by a small margin.

COLES. Charleston, Ill., Nov. 8.—Incomplete returns from Coles County indicate that the Republicans have elected their entire ticket by largest majorities ever known. Roosevelt's majority is estimated at 1,300. Deneen 1,900, McKinley for Congress 500, Mumford for State Senator 500.

DOUGLAS. Tuscola, Ill., Nov. 8.—Douglas County estimated vote on President, from returns in nine towns: Roosevelt, 2,800; Parker, 2,100. A Democratic gain of 700. For Congress, elected to Senate, Thirty-fourth District, Burnett and Miller (Reps.) and Hinds (Dem.) to House.

PIATT. Monticello, Ill., Nov. 8.—Incomplete returns from Piatt County show that the Republicans have carried the county by about 1,300, with the probability strong that the Chicago Charter amendment has carried. The vote for McKinley is estimated at 1,300, with the Democrats losing in a greater ratio. Returns are coming in slowly.

SHELBY. Shelbyville, Ill., Nov. 8.—The Democratic majority of 1,100 is wiped out. Democratic candidates on county ticket concede their defeat. Chaffee (Rep.) has defeated Wallace (Dem.) for State Senator. Incomplete returns give Roosevelt Shelby County by about 200.

DOUGLAS. Arcola, Ill., Nov. 8.—Douglas County goes Republican by the largest majority in its history. The county ticket was all elected. Arcola, usually Democratic, gives Roosevelt a majority of 37.

COLES. Mattoon, Ill., Nov. 8.—Incomplete returns indicate a majority of upward of 1,000 for the State and national Republican tickets in Coles County. McKinley carried the county in 1900. The entire Republican ticket is conceded to Roosevelt. Parker's vote will equal Bryan's in 1900.

JERSEY. Alton, Ill., Nov. 8.—Eight out of thirteen townships in Jersey County give Parker 1,500 and Roosevelt 947. The entire Democratic county ticket is probably elected.

MORGAN. Jacksonville, Ill., Nov. 8.—The vote in Morgan County gives Deneen a majority of 300, a Democratic loss as compared with the county's vote in 1900 of 200. Roosevelt ran ahead of the State ticket 200.
