Y., July 9.—Peter Misen, the Chicago Dane who prefers to be known as Mr. Bowser, made a successful trip through the rapids and whirlpools of Niagara this afternoon in his boat the "Foolkiller." Bowser did not get a cent for making the trip. The Fool Killer is twenty feet long and four feet deep and is made of two-inch planks, with four whirling machinery. The wheel weighs 1,500 pounds.

CALEB POWERS'S CASE IS CALLED.

Former Secretary of State Accused of Complicity in Goebel's Murder.

DELAY TO TUESDAY GRANTED.

Three Bullets Are Said to Have Been Found in Powers's Office—The Fatal Ball.

REPUBLIC SPECIAL. Georgetown, Ky., July 9.—Unless all signs to-night fall, Caleb Powers, former Secretary of State, will be placed on trial for his life in the Scott Circuit Court tomorrow, on charge of being accessory before the fact to the murder of Governor William Goebel.

The case of the Commonwealth against Yontay, Powers, Davis, Whitaker and Combs, charged with complicity in the murder of William Goebel at Frankfort, January 29, were called before Judge Courtill on a change of venue to-day.

The work of selecting a jury was first entered upon, and the panel of names first named to draw from was read.

The defendant, former Secretary of State Caleb Powers, was brought into court and took a seat with the attorneys for the defense. Though he has been in jail since March 18, he shows but few marks of confinement and looks in good spirits.

The attorneys for the defense, sixteen in number, held a meeting to-night, after which it was found that they were anxious for trial and will announce ready to-morrow if they can possibly have their witnesses on hand.

Everybody searched for weapons. By order of Judge Cantrell, every person who entered the courtroom—attorneys, witnesses, spectators and reporters—were searched for weapons. Several revolvers and long knives were taken up at the door.

Former Governor Brown did not like to be searched. In fact, he objected to it so much that he charged his possession Sheriff Schuff and then to Judge Cantrell. "There is no law," said he to Judge Cantrell, "that permits a man to be searched by a court officer."

USED A WOMAN AS HIS SHIELD.

From Behind Her Tipton Day Killed Deputy Marshal Wilson.

OFFICER FEARED TO SHOOT.

When He Fell His Companion Opened Fire and Day Died at the End of a Desperate Duel.

REPUBLIC SPECIAL. Mount Sterling, Ky., July 9.—The body of Deputy United States Marshal J. Howard Wilson arrived here to-day and will be buried to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The story of the killing is more thrilling as the facts become known. When Tipton Day was located, Wilson and his deputy hid in some bushes and allowed Day and Bush and the two women to pass them and then came from their place of concealment and ran within a few steps and demanded their surrender.

Stamper then ran to Wilson, turned him over, took his forty-five gun and again advanced. From Wilson's side one of Day's arms had been disabled, but with the other he ejected the empty shells and replaced them with two cartridges and deliberately aimed again, but missed.
