A MURDERER AT LARGE.

Henry Killen the Coolidge Train Robber and Murderer Breaks Jail.

Chief of Police Barnett received a telegram yesterday to keep a strict look out for one Henry Killen, who together with three confederates, made his escape from the Topeka, Kansas, jail Wednesday afternoon. He is about 20 years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high has blue eyes and a very large mouth, would be considered fair complexioned, and is badly crippled in right hand, having lost the second finger at the first joint. The crime for which Killen was in custody was committed in the summer of 1883. Early one morning he and two assistants attacked a Santa Fe train at Coolidge, Kansas for the purpose of robbing the express car. Killen went to the engineer and called upon him to throw up his hands. The engineer did not do this quite quick enough for the free booter and he was shot down. The fireman was treated in a similar manner but recovered. After securing a few dollars from the express car the scoundrels made their escape. The company offered large rewards for the capture of the men, and put their own detectives on the track. Killen was finally captured at the residence of his brother near Carthage, Mo., last fall. He is a desperate character and it is safe to say that he will not be taken alive if given an opportunity to resist.

Frank P. Anderson, of Nevada, says he has a contract to grade fifty miles of road from Ft. Scott west, on the St. Louis, Kansas City & Colorado railroad, and left Nevada last week to commence work. Mr. Anderson is a contractor of some notoriety and we only hope the word given out by him that he will commence work at once, may prove true. A thousand men are at work on this road near St. Louis and are coming this way as fast as possible. The indications are that the road will be built, and still the company are asking nothing but pushing work right along.

Born Together—Die Together.

Reading, Pa., Feb. 25.—A man named Lillie owns a mill at Shamokin hill. His twin daughters, Katie and Susie, aged 6 years, strayed to an upstairs room in the mill where a shaft was revolving. While at play the little ones ventured too near the machinery, their clothing caught in the shaft and they were drawn around it and whirled with each revolution. After being thrown around for about an hour they were found by an elder sister, who had come to look for them. When the machinery was stopped their bodies were found to be terribly lacerated. The skull of Katie was badly fractured and her body in other ways was badly mutilated, causing her death. Susie still lives, but her chances of recovery are small. Her entire body is more or less injured, several bones being broken.

The St. Louis papers are justly excited over the washing away by the Missouri river of the graves of twenty persons who died of small-pox at that city two years ago. The evening Chronicle says:

Startling news comes from Kansas City this morning. Twenty graves at that point in which reposed the festering bodies of small-pox victims have been glutted by the waters of the Missouri, and their contents are now being borne to the Mississippi, from which we draw our water supply. The dispatch states that the bodies "floated off in their coffins," from which we infer, many of them, in an advanced state of decay, and evidently have gone to pieces. The bodies have all been buried a year or more, and the flesh, in a high state of decomposition, must as a result impregnate the water with a film of small particles of human corruption and disease. It would be hard to conceive what evil may result from drinking such water, since in addition to the decomposed human flesh is added the fact that the bodies were impregnated with the worst human diseases.

It appears that the number of immigrants from Europe to this country last year was the smallest of any year since 1869. The total was 346,149 of whom 97,913 came from Germany, 36,277 from Ireland, and 25,657 from England. In selecting homes, 7,162 of them concluded to try Missouri; but then 8,211 chose New Jersey, and that spoils what would otherwise be a very gratifying fact.

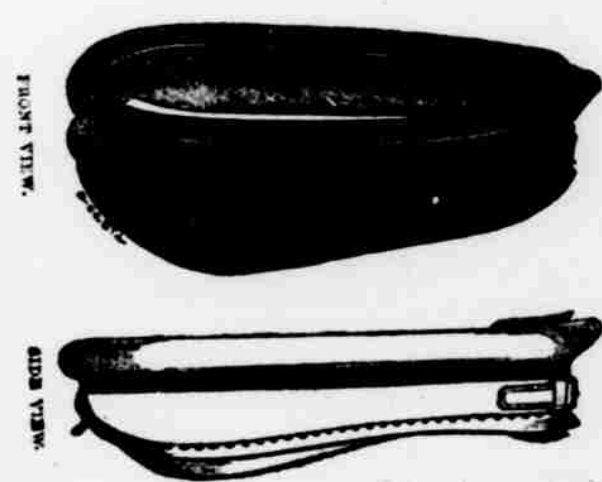
