

MISS WINNIE DAVIS.

"The Daughter of the Confederacy" and Her Broken Engagement.

New York, Oct. 15.—The engagement of Miss Winnie Davis, "the daughter of the confederacy," and Mr. Alfred Wilkinson of Syracuse is definitely broken. The principals themselves authorize this announcement.

Trust Prices to Foreigners.

When a merchant has slow sales and a large stock he booms his business by putting down his prices and inviting his customers to come around to stock up with what they need and he does not.

When a protected manufacturer's trust is in the same condition; when it has a large stock and trade is dull because prices are high, it never gives its regular customers the benefit.

This is necessarily true because when they offer goods to foreigners they meet competition in open market and sell at reasonable figures or

not at all. When they get beyond our custom house lines it takes two to make a bargain. They cannot say to the consumer "Pay our price or go without."

We have their own advertisement in the South American edition of the Engineering and Mining Journal in evidence. They published these advertisements of prices for circulation in Buenos Ayres; they advertise their first quality of bronzed axes at \$6.75 a dozen to these foreigners when their price at home is \$7.76.

And so with the other trusts. Mr. John Wannamaker is advertising that his bargain counter will sell tinware and kitchen goods below the present prices as he laid in a large stock before the passage of the McKinley bill.

The goods thus exported are not a surplus left over after supplying the home demand. They are gotten rid of to prevent the home demand from being so fully supplied that home prices will fall.

The President's Mind.

Washington, Oct. 15.—The president has at length had his mind definitely made up, it is stated, not to call an extra session of congress to pass the force bill.

The next session will be very short. Three months, less the Christmas holiday, afford little time for anything except the regular appropriation bills.
