CONFEDERATE ASSOCIATION.

Meeting of the Vice-President in St. Louis.

The vice presidents of these confederate associations of Missouri met Wednesday last in St. Louis twelve members being present. Kansas was chosen for their third annual reunion on Wednesday and Thursday, August 19 and 20. The council, sitting in the executive committee of the confederate association, heard reports from the several confederate districts, which aggregated a total cash and subscription of \$18,541. Five offers were received for locating the Home, and without making official action, an adjournment was had to Saturday, December 20. This congressional district was represented by vice-president M. C. Cronough of this county, who reported upward of \$2,300 in cash and good subscriptions, collected only from a portion of Henry, Bates and Vernon counties.

Letters received from distinguished gentlemen unable to be present. Ed A. DeArmond, county elect from the twelfth district, accompanied his letter with a \$100. Gen. John McNulty, a distinguished officer in the army, also sent a remembrance in the shape of a check for \$25. Cronough sent a telegram. He also subscribed liberally. Cronough.

The cause, so far as known, is a mystery.

AT PINE RIDGE AGENCY.

THE INDIANS TO BE ORDERED TO STOP DANCING.

Enough Hostiles There to Wipe Out the Troops if They Wish to.

Pine Ridge Agency, Nov. 21.—It is probable that the troops will take the field against the ghost dances about Saturday. Everything points to a long campaign against the Sioux, who are now inflamed at the presence of the colored troopers of the ninth cavalry, and who are growing more fanatical every day over the religious dances. The situation is so grave that old Indian fighters and scouts refuse to express an opinion as to the final outcome of this trouble. This is certain, that if the Sioux on Pine Ridge were to take a notion to attack the troops now in camp here there would not be a soldier, civilian, woman or child left to tell the story of the onslaught. There are 1,500 heavily armed warriors within a radius of 40 miles of the agency and the available force to place in the field would not amount to 500 and 100 are Indian police employes and half-breeds. Post Trader Assay says if the present force of soldiers were to take the field they would be the worst licked body of men since the massacre of the Seventh Cavalry on the Little Big Horn. The Gatling and Hotchkiss guns would be of no service in a campaign, as the Indians always scatter in an engagement and it would be like firing a magazine to kill a squirrel. Mr. Assay is of the opinion that the fighting will take place in the Bad Lands.

It seemed to be the present programme of the army to call in all friendly Indians and then go after the hostiles without quarter. Last night 35 Indian police at the agency on fleetfooted ponies were sent out to the surrounding country to warn the friendly Indians to come to the agency Friday and ever since sunrise the Sioux who have not taken part in or have no sympathy for the religious craze have been riding into camp.

TO GIVE AN ULTIMATUM.

Sixty of the of these friendly Indians will to-morrow be drawn up in the beef corral and heavily armed. Then the Indian police, under command of one who has the sword, a captain, and Lieutenant Fasthorse will lead the friendly Sioux to the camps of the ghost dancers and demand that the dances cease. If the hostiles refuse to comply with this command they will be warned again then if the order is disregarded the soldiers will take the field and put down the rebellion by force of arms. The trouble will come when the effort is made to stop the dancers. Little Wound, Young Man Afraid of his Horse, Torn Belly, Swift Bird, Big Road, Six Feathers and Little Man have openly and repeatedly declared that they will fight if the soldiers attempt to coerce them. They have great influence with their people.

Scouts from the hostile camps ride along the ridges of the Buttes in the agency. One of them who rode up to Wolf Creek was in full war dress. Through a pair of field glasses the warrior could be seen studying the camp intently. At 9 o'clock last night two horsemen galloped furiously up to the agency. They were Baptiste, or Little Baptist, or Little Bat, one of Crook's famous scouts, and Louis Mossos, another scout. They rode 70 miles from Fort Robinson without rest at the command of the government, and are now in the White Clay district, studying the movements of the hostiles. Later in the night three more scouts returned from the Wounded Knee and reported to Gen. Brooke that the Indians were still dancing with their rifles on their backs.
