Five State Tickets.

Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 5—The socialist labor party to day filed with the secretary of State their State ticket, which consists of the following nominees, all from St. Louis: Judge of Supreme court, Albert E. Sanderson; superintendent of public schools, James A. Rendell; railroad and warehouse commissioner, L. Seller. The Democrats and Populists have filed their State nominees, but the Republicans and Prohibitionists have not done so up to date. There will be five State tickets voted for at the November State election, to-wit: Democratic, Republican, Populist, Prohibition and Social Labor. It is yet believed that a deal is between the Republicans and Populists to withdraw the Populist candidate for Judge of the Supreme court in favor of the Republican nominee.
