T. T. Wemott of Kansas City renews for '96

The city clerk approximates the indebtedness of the town to Jan. 1st to be \$9,226.67. The total receipts of the city for the six months ending Dec. 31st, 1894, were \$2,000.76 leaving a balance in the treasury of Jan. 1st of \$293.09.

The bodies of Thomas Davis and Thomas Ward, the two coal miners crushed to death, Monday while at work in the Wise Bros' mine near Shobe, were recovered Tuesday. The men were at work removing props when caught by the cave in. Their bodies, says the Review, was horribly crushed.

The Lamar Democrat, in speaking of the work of pupils of the different schools on exhibition at the South west Teachers' Association, held in that town during the holidays, pays this compliment to the Rich Hill schools and Prof. Thurman: "In this connection we desire to speak of other work on exhibit. Rich Hill had the largest exhibit made, and much credit is due Supt. Thurman for his management in getting up this display. It is the first time in the history of the Rich Hill schools that a display of this kind was ever made. Indeed, it was a creditable thing for the Rich Hill schools. Supt. Thurman is a man who understands the school work, and as long as he stands at the head of the schools they will rank among the best in the state."

Found Dead in Her Home.

Adrain, Mo., Jan. 6.—A farmer by the name of L. C. Wells, living six miles northeast of this place, went to a near neighbor's on some business, staying several hours. Upon his return he was met by his little 6-year old girl exclaiming: "Mother is dead."

Upon entering the house he found his wife lying on the floor on her face, cold in death, the fires had all gone out, and no one was at the house but the two little children, aged respectively 6 and 2 years. A coroner's jury decided that heart failure was the cause of the death.

Telephone System for Rich Hill.

At the last meeting of the council a franchise was granted to W. F. Tygard, granting him permission to operate a telephone system in Rich Hill, in connection with the Butler line.

Mr. Tygard was seen last evening by a Tribune representative and asked regarding the latest developments. He replied that J. Hunnel & Co., St. Louis, had agreed to put in the telephone system in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance, and that work would commence in thirty or forty days. This will give Rich Hill connection with Butler, Harrisonville, Pleasant Hill and other towns in Missouri.—Rich Hill Tribune.

Crushed in a Mine.

Rich Hill, Mo., Jan. 7.—Thomas Davis and Thomas Ward, two men employed in Wise Bros' coal mines north of this city, were crushed to death by a cave in this afternoon. The unfortunate men were engaged in pulling props or "shooting pillars" at the time of the accident and their dead bodies have not yet been recovered. The top of one whole room is said to have fallen in and various exaggerated rumors grew out of the accident, one being to the effect that a number of other miners were entombed. Ward was a single man whose mother resides in Rosedale, Kan. News of his death was wired her tonight. Davis is a man of family residing in this city, and leaves a wife who is in a precarious condition.

Heroism of a Boy.

Sedalia, Mo., Jan. 3.—A Christ was tree caught fire at the house of Harry Fisher last night and soon the house was in a blaze. Henry Steffens, aged 15 years, learning that two children, aged 5 and 6 years, were asleep in the house, dashed through the flames and rescued them, carrying them from the building wrapped in comforts, but in so doing he was badly burned about his hands, arms and face.

Cut His Throat in Jail.

Mexico, Mo., Jan. 5.—This afternoon news came from Bowling Green to the effect that Thomas Quidan, the former section boss at Larrabee, who killed Gottfried Kloppenstein of 1007 West Twenty-second street, Chicago, and who was only sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, had attempted to kill himself by cutting his throat with a razor in the jail at Bowling Green. The razor had been given to Quidan with which to shave himself. The wound will prove fatal. His attorneys had made a motion for a new trial.
