While butchering hogs last Tuesday morning a little 2-year old child of George Blake who lives five or six miles north-west of town in the hills, came running out of the house to where the men were at work and none of those engaged noticing it at the time it ran over to a tub of boiling hot water and stumbling fell head foremost into the tub. They rushed to its aid at the first splash but were too late to save it, and the little one was very badly scalded on the head, face, neck, shoulders, body and arms and hands, so badly that the skin all peeled off when they took it, clothing off. Dr. Daniels was called from town and reached there as soon as he could but the child was so badly injured that he could only alleviate its suffering and it died that night about 11 o'clock.

Some little excitement, but no danger, was occasioned last Wednesday morning by the burning out of a fire at the lower school building, the fire leading from Miss Myrtle Williams' room. An air passage runs through the wall and enters the flue above the stove pipe hole and this air duct had become clogged with soot and caught on fire from the burning flue. At the opening of the air passage a square box of wood surrounded it and when this wood caught fire the coals dropped to the floor, and this was what caused the scare. The scholars of all the rooms were gotten out of the building without trouble or confusion, and some little boys sent down town for help. A number of business men responded and the fire, at no time dangerous, was put out. No alarm was given as account of the scare it might give the parents of the little people at the school. A few children after the fire the scholars returned back at their studies.

Senator Thos. F. Lane came down from Jefferson City yesterday on a short visit to his family and to look after some business matters pertaining to his law business. He says the long wait on the lieutenant-governor account was very much of a drag on legislation and the body is not getting off as rapidly as it would had there been no controversy to delay the start. In the assignment of committees in the Senate, Senator Lane fared exceedingly well, as he was placed on seven different committees, being made chairman of one. His committee assignments are chairman of Fish and Game committee, and members of the committee on Education, Text Books and Public Schools; Township Organization, County Boundaries, Swamp Lands, Ditches and Drains; Criminal Jurisprudence; Wills and Probate Law; Immigration; Universities, Normal Schools, Agricultural College and School of Mines, nearly every one of which is an important committee, and all will require much attention and work, but the Senator will make good as he likes the kind of work these committees will require of him. He will start on his return to Jefferson City either Sunday or Monday.

Edward W. Wright, many years ago a well known citizen of this city, died at his home at Poplar Bluff, last Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, from congestion of the stomach. He was well known here and made his last life at Doniphan, beginning business in a little old building, known to the older citizens as Col. Righter's office. He was born in Arkansas, near Pittman's ferry, and came here as a young man with his brother James, who survives him. His age was 60 years, as he was born May 13, 1849. He moved from here to the Bluff in 1886 and with J. R. Wright of this city—no direct relation—engaged in the hardware business under the firm name of J. R. and E. W. Wright, J. L. Dalton being the manager of the store. In 1887 Mr. Dalton purchased J. R. Wright's interest and in 1902 the firm of Wright-Dalton-Bell-Anchor Store Company was incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000, and he was elected vice-president of the company, which position he held at his death. Besides his interests in the company he had other business interests to which he gave immediate attention. He was married in this city in November 1877, to Margaret L. Collier, a daughter of Uncle Jack Collier, well known here, who was a resident here for many years before he moved to the Bluff. Mrs. Wright died in July 1908. They have six children all grown, five daughters and one son. The funeral was held on Tuesday, the B. P. O. E. lodge having charge of the obsequies and Rev. Wm Baker of the Christian church of that city officiating.

Announcement of Farmers Institute and Fair.

We wish to state to everybody interested in the Farmers Institute and Agricultural show to be held here next fall, that the management is arranging the work in detail and will have 2000 catalogues printed as early as possible which will give the full weeks institute work complete, names and subjects of the lecturers, classification of all farm products and premiums on each exhibit, names of the several committees. There will be 6 committees who will have charge of their respective work. One each on live stock, corn, fruit, dairying, poultry, and home-hold and garden products. The last named work will be in charge of a committee of ladies who will arrange some prize contest work for the girls as well as the married ladies. The chairman of each of the committees have been selected whose names will be given as soon as each have accepted. The management have sought to select workers who will take right hold of the work with enthusiasm and cooperate with the board in making next fall's show not only a success but a grand success. We have taken up this grand early in order to give all ample time to grow and prepare all kinds of products. It will be some time before the catalogues can be gotten up and printed, but they will be out in ample time and in meantime all necessary information will be published in the county papers which we should not fail to thank for their kind generosity in offering us valuable space for this work.

We expect to demonstrate next fall just where our county stands in the agricultural world. It is not a question of what CAN we do, but what will WILL we do. The writer ventures this assertion: that to take the whole list of soil products—the adaptability of Ripley county is unquestionable in the state and would not back down very much to make it the United States. We mean proven adaptability and not development, so if we can establish this we are standing in our own light if we do not develop and utilize the natural advantages that surround us. We do not mean to discuss this matter at length as we do not think anyone will wish to take issue with us, but the only important matter remains in knowing how and doing it. The other conditions are at our command, and now there is no better way, no less expensive way, (we should say no more profitable way) to secure this modern education than through an agricultural show and institute. For instance take corn. How many in Ripley county grow pure bred corn? Are you aware that the best corn here being longer than in the corresponding section of this state, that we can develop not only a kernel that will score far above theirs but approaches the ideal or perfect kernel and furthermore the season and soil better enables the ear to develop shape, weight and market condition? Who has ordered seed corn from the corn section who did not grow better corn than the seed the first year? So all along down the line the same rule applies. Our fruit is unexcelled, it can't be beat for poultry raising, a natural dairy and sheep section, a truck garden or can grow anything. What more do we want? More cooperation and knowledge how to make farming pay some profit above expenses and at the same time maintain the fertility of the soil.

We have the pleasure this year of recognizing experts for the lecture and judging work and on one or two more subjects than we have had heretofore. It is the wish of the association that every farmer will commence now to grow something for the show. We expect the premiums to be offered on all exhibits to be more inviting and worth working for. We want all who wish to enter the mess class in corn contest to leave their names at either of the drug stores in Doniphan and to do so by April 1st. This will enable us to arrange space for exhibits. Any farmer in the county may enter and may grow any kind of corn he wishes, but should grow some variety that is true to type. The state contest also will be open to farmers free of charge. Stock and poultry breeders have plenty of time to prepare some very creditable exhibits. We sincerely ask the earnest cooperation of every farmer and business man in the county in this work which is purely educational and progressive.
